## ROBBERS GET \$60,000 LOOT.

**Hold Up Train in Mississippi and  
Blow Express Safe.**  
Corinth, Miss.—Mobile and Ohio pas-  
senger train No. 4, northbound, was  
held up and the express safe blown open  
by four men heavily armed and  
masked.

Bloodhounds have been telegraphed  
for and a posse has been organized to  
take up the pursuit.

It is reported the safe contained  
\$60,000 in currency.  
Where the robbers boarded the train is  
not known. Engineer Wilden and  
Fireman Kaufman first learned of  
their presence when two of the men  
crawled over the tender with revolvers  
drawn and commanded that the train  
be brought to a halt at a point designat-  
ed. The command was obeyed.

In the meantime other members of  
the band had gained entrance to the  
express car and after subduing Ex-  
press Messenger Snoddy, set the ex-  
plosive, which was touched off when  
the train came to a stop.

After taking the contents of the  
safe, the four took to the woods with-  
out attempting to rifle the mail or mo-  
lester the passengers.

No attempts will be made to pen-  
etrate the densely wooded river bot-  
tom where the men are believed to be  
in hiding, until the arrival of a detail  
of railroad officers and bloodhounds  
from Jackson, Tenn., who are coming  
about a special.

## BRIBERY PROBE STARTS.

**Four Mexico Representatives Formally  
Arraigned.**  
Santa Fe, N. M.—With the formal  
arraignment of Representative Manuel  
Cordova, Julian Trujillo, Louis R.  
Montoya and J. H. Lucero, arrested  
on a charge of soliciting a bribe of  
\$5,000 for their collective votes for  
United States senator, the investiga-  
tion by lower house into the alleged  
corruption was begun.

The accused legislators, who are to  
be tried first by a committee of 15 ap-  
pointed by the speaker, have employed  
counsel to defend them against the  
charge, which they now deny. Their  
defense will be that they were led into  
the trap as a result of a political con-  
spiracy, believing they were going to  
attend a caucus at the time they vis-  
ited a room in the hotel, where it is al-  
leged they received \$500 each on their  
promise to vote for a certain candi-  
date for senator.

The investigation of the alleged  
bribery of the four members will be  
pushed vigorously by the committee  
and all the sessions will be public.  
The men were formally served with  
warrants charging them with a felony.  
They are in the custody of the sheriff  
of Santa Fe county.

## SMUGGLES DIAMONDS IN HAT

**San Francisco Woman Admits Her  
Offense to Officers.**  
New York—Mrs. Banche Carson, a  
fashionably dressed widow of San  
Francisco, had diamond earrings con-  
cealed in her hat when she passed cus-  
tom inspection on her arrival from In-  
dianapolis, according to a reported admission  
made to authorities.

Mrs. Carson declared only a package  
of unstrung pearls, for which she paid  
duty on the valuation of \$850. Cus-  
tom officers brought the woman from  
her hotel for further examination,  
asserting that the pearls were worth  
\$7,500.

The woman broke down and ad-  
mitted, it was said, that she had hid-  
den two diamond earrings in her hat  
and had other jewelry which although  
the authorities valued at \$20,000.

Mrs. Carson was haled, charged with  
smuggling, in \$2,000 bail.  
Mrs. Carson gave her address as 925  
Gough street, San Francisco.

## Women to Calm Insane.

Los Angeles—Because he believes  
women's voices calm the insane much  
more quickly than do those of men,  
Dr. J. A. Reilly, superintendent of the  
California hospital for the insane at  
Patton, announced that it is his inten-  
tion of replacing all male nurses of  
that institution with women. "The  
insane are more amenable to the soft  
word of a woman than to the threat or  
command of a man," said Dr. Reilly.  
"I never have found a man so insane  
as to forget his respect for a woman."

**New York May Buy Temple.**  
New York—Following J. P. Mor-  
gan's long sojourn in Egypt this win-  
ter, reports have reached this city to  
the effect that he is negotiating for  
the purchase and removal to America  
of the famous ruins of the Temple of  
Phiaee. The temple is threatened  
with destruction owing to the rise in  
the level of the upper Nile as a result  
of the enlargement of the Assuan dam.  
The cost of the work would be  
more than \$8,000,000.

**Great Earth Block to Be Pumped**  
San Francisco—The exposition offi-  
cials have awarded the contract for  
the filling in of a submerged part of  
the world's fair site. Work is to be  
begun at once. One million cubic  
yards of earth is to be pumped from  
the bottom of the bay by suction  
dredges, the area to be filled covering  
several blocks.

**300 Adrift on Ice Floes.**  
St. Petersburg—Three ice-breaking  
steamers are en route from the Neva  
in the direction of the island of Reval,  
in the Gulf of Finland, where 300 fish-  
ermen are adrift on floating ice. They  
are in imminent danger of losing their  
lives.

**Peculiar Chinese Industries.**  
In Taichow there are some strange  
industries. One is the raising of the  
machi, a sort of large pheasant, the  
tail feathers of which are very valu-  
able, as they are needed for the dress  
bats of mandarin. Timber is very  
plentiful in this district and is sent  
away by raft to all parts.

## BOYS' AMUSEMENTS IN CUBA

**Spin Tops in Spring Just Like Their  
American Cousins—Reason for  
Custom is Problem.**

Boys certainly are boys the world  
over, and the little Cuban youngsters  
as like Young America as two peas  
in a pod, says a Havana correspondent  
in the New York Sun. Just why the  
Cuban hopeful should resort to the  
sport of top spinning in the springtime  
and no other is inexplicable, but it is  
true here just as it is in the states.  
It is not remarkable that they should  
spin tops. The strange thing about it  
is that they should only take up this  
amusement in the spring. In the  
United States there is a reason for  
this. The winter has kept the young-  
sters more or less bottled up and the  
ports he has indulged in have had  
their reason in cold weather. With  
the coming of the warm spring days  
and the disappearance of snow and  
ice, the top inevitably appears first  
and all has its run until super-  
seded by marbles, the playing of which  
a better suited to the still warmer  
days following.

But in Cuba there is no such reason.  
So far as the climate is concerned the  
youngsters can spin tops successfully  
round one end of the year to the other.  
Why do they do it only in the spring?  
That this is a fact cannot be contro-  
verted, and it is done, too, by boys  
who have never set foot on American  
oil. Nor has the practice come with  
the American flag.

Is it then psychological? Is there  
anything in the mental make-up of the  
people boy which irresistibly compels  
him to seek his top in the months of  
March and April? Can it be heredi-  
tary, handed down through all the  
ages from the days of Noah's ark?  
If it is this we have the explanation  
of the reason why Yankees in a cold  
climate and Cubans in a hot one spin  
tops in the same months of the spring  
and at no other time, let some student  
of the race furnish another.

## HERE IS A NEW PUSHMOBILE

Imitation of Automobile Recently  
Built by Philadelphia Boys Makes  
Splendid Racer.

The pushmobile itself is new, but  
a new type of pushmobile was recently  
built by a couple of Philadelphia  
boys, who won a race with it. As  
most boys know, the pushmobile is an  
imitation of an automobile, and the  
majority are made by their owners.  
The vehicle shown here has this ad-  
vantage—there is a long handle  
pivoted to the back, and the "pusher"

propels it by this means, which en-  
ables him to run in any position he  
likes. Otherwise he has to run con-  
tinually in a bent-over attitude. An-  
other big advantage of this handle is  
that it can be raised at right angles  
with the seat of the machine, and the  
pusher can jump up on a cross-bar  
that will then be at the bottom, and  
ride there while going down grade or  
after a vigorous shove, and get  
rested. The time and energy thus  
saved are important factors in a race.

**Who Are Our Neighbors?**

**Troops Told to Unpack.**  
Leavenworth, Kan.—An order was  
received at headquarters at Fort Leavenworth that the Seventh Infantry,  
which has been held in readiness to  
move at a moment's notice, may un-  
pack. Every organization in the post  
has been in readiness for active ser-  
vice for almost two months. The order  
is construed to mean that the trouble  
in Mexico has subsided and that no  
additional troops will be needed on the  
border, for the present, at least.

**Amundsen Will Lecture.**  
Washington, D. C.—Roald Amund-  
sen, discoverer of the South Pole, will  
visit the United States next June.  
His first North American lecture on  
the successful Antarctic expedition  
will be made before the National Geo-  
graphical society in Washington.  
President Henry Garrett received a  
telegram from Captain Amundsen,  
accepting the society's invitation.

## BIG STRIKE IS OVER

**Lawrence Textile Workers Return  
to Work in Mills.**

New Bedford Employes Only Hold  
Out for Larger Raise—Consumers  
Will Bear Burden.

Boston—The great Lawrence strike,  
which brought in its train increased  
wages for 275,000 textile workers in  
New England, was officially declared  
off at all the mills in Lawrence, hav-  
ing accomplished its purpose, in the  
opinion of the leaders.

It is generally believed that ad-  
vances in wages or reduction in hours  
of paper mill employes, bagging and  
burlap workers, machinists and opera-  
tives in other industries, all are trace-  
able to the movement which owed its  
origin in Lawrence. The number of  
persons thus to benefit is more than  
300,000.

Advances in the price of woolen and  
cotton goods which have been made or  
which are in prospect probably will  
place upon the ultimate consumer  
the cost of the burden of the additional  
cost to the textile manufacturers. This  
will aggregate between ten and  
twelve million dollars in the next  
year, it is estimated.

Mill agents, in announcing advance  
in prices, have said frankly that the  
upward trend is the result of wage ad-  
vances.

New Bedford, where the manufac-  
turers of the finer grades of cotton  
goods have refused to accede to the  
demands of their employes for an ad-  
ditional five per cent, has displaced  
Lawrence as the center of interest in  
the textile situation.

Unless the mill owners give the in-  
crease demanded within a few days, it  
is feared that a strike of from 25,000  
to 30,000 operatives will ensue.

While an increase of five per cent  
has been offered, the New Bedford  
operatives are insistent that they re-  
ceive 10 per cent.

Secretary Devolt, of the Manufac-  
turers' association, has promised that  
the mill owners would decide early in  
the week, whether this should be  
granted.

The suggestion has been made that  
an immediate increase of 7 1/2 per cent  
be given with a promise of an addi-  
tional 2 1/2 per cent on a given date.  
This may be the basis of a compro-  
mise.

## ONLY HEALTHY CAN MARRY.

**Chicago Cathedral to Turn Away  
Ailing Twains.**

Chicago—Dean Walter T. Sumner  
of the Episcopal Cathedral of Saints  
Peter and Paul, preached a sermon  
Sunday upon the "Sacrament of Mar-  
riage," in which he made the follow-  
ing announcement:  
"After consultation with Right  
Rev. C. F. Anderson, bishop of Chi-  
cago, and with his approval, Dean  
Sumner and his co-workers of the  
Cathedral of Saints Peter and Paul,  
have agreed upon an advanced policy  
with regard to the administration of  
marriage in the cathedral.  
"Beginning with Easter, no person  
will be married in the cathedral un-  
less they present a certificate of  
health from a reputable physician to  
the effect that they are normal physi-  
cally and mentally and have neither  
an incurable nor a communicable dis-  
ease."  
"This step is taken only after  
months of study of the situation  
and deliberation as to its advisability.  
It is believed that this stand will meet  
with the immediate sympathy of the  
clergy in the church at large, all of  
whom have long felt the undesirabil-  
ity of being party to the marriage of  
persons who, because of their physical  
condition, should never be allowed to  
enter into the marriage state and  
propagate their species."

**Strike's Back Broken.**  
Aberdeen, Wash.—That the back of  
the I. W. W. movement in the big  
mill strike here has been practically  
broken was evidenced by the fact that  
despite the hundreds of strikers who  
surrounded the Aberdeen Lumber &  
Shingle company's plant, the mill,  
with a full crew, is kept in operation.  
It is understood here that the har-  
bor mills will resume regular opera-  
tions immediately and that all em-  
ployees will be Americans with fam-  
ilies, receiving the minimum scale of  
\$2.25 a day.

**Americans Quell Mutiny.**  
Charleston, S. C.—United States  
marines from the cutter Yamacraw  
have charge of the Haytien gunboat  
Ferrier, the crew of which mutinied  
here. Then [went on strike be-  
cause they had not received their pay  
for three months, and fearing serious  
trouble, the commanding officer, Wil-  
liam F. Watts, called upon Captain  
West, of the Yamacraw, for protec-  
tion. The United States officer sent  
Lieutenant Brookway and 15 marines  
to the gunboat. There was no resis-  
tance to the marines taking charge.
