Woman Found Dead in Shack—Husband Missing

Lying on the floor of the cook shack near River Mill, where she made her home with her husband, Mrs. Charles Alexander, aged 44, was found dead Tuesday morning about 11 o'clock by J. C. Bradford, superintendent of the mill. Her husband, a camp cook, left the place Sunday at 10 o'clock and has not yet been found.

Charles Kramer of Portland, J. Kramer of Newburg and Mrs. Louis J. Conant of Portland, brothers and sister of the dead woman attended the funeral which took place yesterday afternoon from the Hawthorn chapel. They are unable to account for the whereabouts of the husband. They admit the couple were addicted to liquors. They insist Alexander was of a quiet disposition and that there was no trouble. They believe he left before she died and that he is probably in Portland on a spree.

Suspicion rose when the body was found completely covered with a blanket the upper edge tucked under the head. A towel partly folded was under the chin. But there was no evidence of a struggle and examination showed no marks of violence. Dr. Adix testified at the inquest held by Coroner Wilson that the woman had been dead not more than 24 hours. Nothing in the house, apparently, had been disturbed. The jury after hearing Dr. Adix, A. J. Dwyer who employed the Alexanders at the logging camp, and J. C. Bradford who found the body, decided death was the result of acute alcoholism.
