No, East Clackamas for a dozen or two good reasons which have been thoroughly presented, asks division simply on its merits and in the name of justice to its people. The Progress hopes that the Courier will give the proposition careful consideration and if it then believes that East Clackamas is not entitled to stand on its own feet, it certainly has the right to say so. But don't talk about Multnomah being back of the movement, for it's not so.

Progressives Win at the Recent Primaries

Progressives generally carried Oregon, at the primary, Roosevelt having a plurality over LaFollett and Taft of about 5,000. Ben Selling won over Senator Bourne by about 6,000. Wilson beat Clark and Harmon.

Clackamas county went for Roosevelt and Selling. Estacada precinct, however, voted for LaFollette, 73 to 47 for Roosevelt and 33 for Taft.

E. B. Tongue for district attorney won over Norblad easily. He carried Estacada 106 to 43. W. H. Mattoon was nominated commissioner and F. M. Gill, another Estacada man was nominated for representative practically leading the ticket in Estacada with 130. C. Schubel and C. Schnoerr are the other republican representatives.

In Estacada precinct W. Givens was nominated for justice, W. A. Jones for constable and E. W. Bartlett for committeeman.

The following county officers were nominated by the republicans: Commissioner, W. H. Mattoon; sheriff, E. C. Hackett; clerk, W. L. Mulvey; assessor, James F. Nelson; recorder, L. E. Williams; treasurer, J. A. Tufts; school superintendent, T. J. Gary; coroner, William J. Wilson; surveyor, D. T. Meldrum.

The democrats have hopes of electing their candidate for recorder, E. M. Gaffney, because the republican nominee, L. E. Williams has disappeared and is likely not to return.

Estacada Saloon Men Are Held Not Guilty

Because the county court did not order the election of 1908, which resulted in Estacada precinct going dry, Judge Campbell of the circuit court, Tuesday, instructed the jury to find not guilty Meister & Yenke, charged with violating the local option law.

The case attracted much attention and was vigorously fought by District Attorney Tongue, and Assistant Stipp, assisted by Mr. Baker the anti-saloon league attorney. C. W. Devore and G. B. Dimick appeared for the defendants.

It was shown that the county clerk made up the ballots for the county election, without noting that the county court had not ordered the election, the petition never having been before it. It was therefore held invalid. The decision affects other precincts which went dry that election.

The grand jury has re-indicted under the election of 1910, which is of record.
