County Division Advocates  
Marshalling Forces

## TO GO TO OREGON CITY AGAIN

East Clackamas to Meet With Commercial Clubs Next Tuesday for Decision  
...Petitions to be Circulated.

While the committee of local attorneys is preparing the bill for a division of Clackamas county and the creation of Cascade county, as well as petitions, soon to be circulated, another committee is arranging to attend the meeting of the commercial clubs of the county next Tuesday evening at Oregon City. At this meeting an expression of opinion as to whether the west part of the county will object to the withdrawal of East Clackamas will be had. There is reason to believe that the vote will be favorable.

Shortly after the Oregon City meeting, headquarters will be established and an aggressive campaign for division will be maintained until the polls close in November. Men will be started out to secure the necessary 10,000 signers to petitions, so that the bill will go on the ballot. The petitions must be filed with the secretary of state by July 8.

## Commercial Club Good Thing for Every Town

Thomas of Portland, who recently purchased a portion of the John Stormer farm across the Clackamas, was in town Thursday afternoon for a load of furniture and supplies to begin housekeeping on his property. Practically every settler is good for from \$1,000 to \$2,000 the first year which is distributed among the business people of Estacada.

## FINISHES MODERN RESIDENCE

Charles Dubois and Family Move Into New Home—House is One of the Finest This Side of Portland.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dubois have moved into their new home, one of the finest residence properties this side of Portland. The house can hardly be duplicated at a cost of less than \$6,000 and is modern in every respect. It is located on Currin street in the hill district, between Second and Third and commands a beautiful view of the Clackamas valley to the west.

With its excellent heating, lighting and ventilating systems and its sanitary plumbing, it is one of the up-to-the-minute homes and a credit to Estacada.

The basement has re-reinforced concrete walls 8 inches thick, with a floor 10 inches in thickness. The furnace is located in the center and there is a wood lift for use of the kitchen range. It is well lighted with numerous windows and from the floor a chimney 44 feet in height extends, at no point touching the upper floors or the roof, thus rendering doubly certain protection from fire.

### A Home of Comfort.

The first floor is divided into a hall, a living room, dining room, nursery, kitchen, bath and a laundry with hot and cold water attachment. The bath room is modern and the plumbing terminates in a septic tank. The interior finishings are of the finest selected Oregon fir, beautifully grained and matched and done in golden oak stain. The walls of the various rooms are in different tints, har-

monizing with the furniture and hangings. A broad stairway leads to the second floor, which is divided into four bedrooms and a sewing room, all large, airy and well lighted. A toilet and wash room is located on this floor. The wood-work is fir, done in oil, natural finish.

The door knobs throughout are solid brass and the electric chandeliers are of plain, dull tinted brass. The entire house as well as the spacious porch is lighted by electricity with button attachments. A concrete retaining wall has been built along the lot line and the steps up the terrace are of concrete.

## NEW MEMBER OF THE FACULTY

Instructor Will Also Teach Another Branch—All but two Teachers Selected for Next Year.

Keeping in the forefront of development and recognizing that Estacada is located in a farming and fruit district, the local board of education, J. W. Reed, L. E. Belfils and J. P. Wooster, have determined upon adding a teacher of agriculture to the high school next year.

The new instructor, in addition to having charge of the agricultural department, which includes botany and horticulture, will teach another branch. Prof. H. M. James has been selected as principal and Mrs. C. W. DeVore as assistant. Mrs. Altman who has had the seventh and eighth grades, Mrs. Graham, fourth and fifth and Miss Erickson, second and third, have been re-employed. Miss Moehnke sixth and seventh and Miss Hewitt, primary, have indicated that they will not be back and their places are held open. Applications are pouring in from various sources and the board will have no trouble filling the vacancies. Estacada schools have a good reputation and are accredited, so that a graduate may enter Corvallis, without examination.
