HOLD TWO MEETINGS

County division advocates at
George and Garfield

GOOD CROWDS AT BOTH PLACES

Forty Estacada people tour beautiful
George section—Meetings at Eagle
Creek, Barton and Spring-
water next.

With ideal weather, beautiful
surroundings in the groves at the
Country club in Upper Garfield and
at George, county division speakers
were inspired to do their best before
the big crowds which greeted them
the early part of this week. Forty
people from Estacada, Currinsville
and surrounding points accompanied
the speakers and the Cascade male
quartet, picniced at Miller's bridge
in the George district and thorough-
ly enjoyed the day. Many had
never been in the George country.
The pretty farm homes and build-
ings, highly cultivated farms tele-
phone lines, good roads—largely
constructed by volunteer labor—
roused the visitors to great enthu-
siasm. It was a positive treat to
those who had not realized the
possibilities of that prosperous sec-
tion. Upper Garfield too is equally
enjoyable both in improvements and
in the class of citizens and there is
no doubt that every person who
made the trip is more than ever
convinced that Cascade county is to
be the wealthiest in the state. Its
per capita wealth now, before divi-
sion, is more than \$1,000.

First Meeting in Garfield.

The day began with a largely at-
tended meeting at the Country Club
in Garfield. The visitors were met
by G. T. Hunt and a committee of
citizens and the speaking was con-
ducted from the bandstand. By
request Chairman C. W. Devore of
the Cascade executive committee,
presided. The Cascade male quartet
sang several songs during the meet-
ing and talks were made by L. E.
Belfis, J. S. McCurdy and Chair-
man Devore, the latter using a huge
map in illustrating the advantages
of county division. R. M. Standish
circulated petitions which were
signed by every voter and folders,
giving 85 reasons for division were
distributed.

Big Crowd at George.

Through a beautiful country the
visitors drove, after luncheon on
Eagle Creek, and drew up at the
grove near the school house in
George. Adolph Miller, who later
presided at the meeting, A. N.
Jensen and others had prepared an
out door platform in the pretty
grove, from which the speakers
addressed a big crowd of men
women and children. The quartet
sang and in addition to C. W.
Devore, J. S. McCurdy and L. E.
Belfis, R. M. Standish spoke brief-
ly. It has been reported that there
was some opposition to the move-
ment at George, but after hearing
the talks and discussing the matter
openly, many who had been report-
ed averse to division, professed
themselves satisfied and signed the
petition. Only one person declined
to sign and he only because he
thought the division line should
have included Gresham, which is
located in Multnomah county.

Both meetings were highly suc-
cessful. A meeting has been ar-
ranged for Eagle Creek at Elliott's
hall, a week from Saturday night
June 15. A dance will follow the
meeting which will be finished early.
Music will be furnished by the Cas-
cade quartet and the Estacada or-
chestra.

Four new teachers chosen by
Estacada board—Principal
Ford a fine instructor
and Athlete

With four new teachers, including
a principal and with the addition of
an agricultural and industrial de-
partment, the Estacada schools are
keeping well to the forefront. The
board of education has selected
Burgess Ford as principal, Francis
B. Guthrie as assistant and agricul-

tural instructor, Miss Abbie Stites
who takes Miss Moehnke's place
and Miss Eva F. Wash, succeeding
Miss Hewitt.

Mrs. Devore continues as assis-
tant principal. Mrs. Altman as
teacher of eighth and seventh grades;
Mrs. Graham as second and third;
Miss Erickson as fourth and fifth.
Miss Stites will teach fifth and sixth
and Miss Wash, primary.

Burgess Ford is a graduate of
Willamette U; a post graduate of
Northwestern university at Evan-
ston Ill. is president of the Willa-
mette U Alumni and other college
societies. When in college he was
captain of the football, baseball and
track team and is a good athlete.
He is 31 years old and married. He
taught 2 years in Wesleyan U in
Montana and for the past year has
been at Lebanon. The board con-
siders itself fortunate in securing
him, for the Lebanon people were
loath to let him go.

Mr. Guthrie is a graduate of
Wisconsin University agricultural
department and a graduate of the
university proper; has taught
several years in the east and several
years in Africa. He is married.

Miss Stites is a teacher of several
years experience and a graduate of
Willamette university where she
secured a life diploma. Miss Wash
is a graduate of Monmouth Normal
and an accomplished teacher.

Beside agriculture, a course in
German, sewing and athletics will
be added this year.

SHOOTS HERSELF DEAD

Mrs. Lenora Peachin first
wounds her husband

FUNERAL HELD IN ESTACADA

Dependancy and illness cause of deplorable
tragedy—Sergeant Peachin
recently admitted to
practice law.

In ill health and despondent, Mrs.
Lenora Krigbaum Peachin last Sat-
urday morning at 4 o'clock, probab-
ly fatally wounded her husband and
then killed herself by shooting at
her home in Wichita. Her funeral
was held at Mt. Zion church near
here, last Tuesday. Her husband
with two bullet wounds in his head
the surgeons having removed the
lead—is in a critical condition. Lit-
tle hope is entertained for his re-
covery, one bullet having ploughed
through the brain.

Mrs. Peachin, who is a daughter
of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Krigbaum
of Garfield, wrote several letters
accounting for her deed, that her
husband was untrue to her. Her
parents were visiting her at the time
of the tragedy and heard the shots
which ended her life and may end
that of Sergeant E. S. Peachin, a
member of the Portland police force.
The four had visited during the
evening preceding the shooting and
Mrs. Peachin apparently was in her
usual spirits.

Shot while in bed.

When Mrs. Krigbaum reached
her daughter side in the little tent
outside the house, Mrs. Peachin lay
dead a bullet through her heart.
Her husband lay on the bed, one
bullet having struck him in the
back of the head, another having
entered below the eye when he
turned to face his wife; a third had
gone through a finger of his right
hand.

Rev. W. Givens of the Christian
church preached the funeral sermon
at Mt. Zion church in Garfield.
Large crowds of sorrowing friends
of the family attended. Mrs. Peach-
in was 27 years old at time of death.
Sergeant Peachin was very pop-
ular among his brother officers
and highly regarded by all his
wife's relatives. During his spare
moments he studied law and recent-
ly graduated from the University of
Oregon law school. He took the
bar examinations at Salem a week
ago.
