HOLD LIVELY MEETING

Fireworks during county division discussion

EAGLE CREEK'S FINE TURN OUT

Big crowd enjoys talks and the music and dancing which followed. Visiting Estacadians welcomed.

One of the most successful county division meetings in point of attendance, enjoyment and public interest, was held at Eagle Creek last Saturday evening. Elliott's new hall, with its excellent maple floor was prettily decorated and a fine crowd from Eagle Creek and surrounding precincts attended. Estacadians to the number of 100 or more, accompanied by the Estacada orchestra of five pieces and the Cascade male quartet, went in a special car, which returned about 11 o'clock. But nearly every visitor stayed until the windup of the combined meeting and social session which included a delightful dance. The Eagle Creek people proved royal hosts.

"Buzz" Whoops 'er up.

One of the features of the meeting was the appearance of "Buzz" Thomas, Socialist candidate for the legislature, who made a speech against county division. "Jazz" lived up to his name, during his peppery ten minutes talk. Divested of verbiage, his principal argument was that bridge building made high taxes in Clackamas and would be no less in Cascade county. Then he digressed:

"All there is to this thing of division" he said, "is that some fellers at Estacada will starve to death unless they get a chance to suck a public teat. They are just as apt to hang onto the coin as they are at Oregon City. Then they'll over ride the law, because they did when the precinct went dry and the town went wet and they issued licences for saloons. Why there was a feller up there says it ought to be worth \$100 to get me to quit talking against county division. Wasn't that tryin' to bribe me? I've been in every county in this state and they're trying to pull the wool over your eyes about taxes."

Belfils makes answer.

L. E. Belfils in an earnest talk which roused much applause, told "Buzz" that Estacada did not violate the law in issuing licences to saloons, as the supreme court had decreed that an incorporated town could regulate the liquor traffic if the people voted wet.

"I was a member of the council when the licencese was issued," he continued warmly, "and I want to tell you that it would not have been possible for blind piggers to exist had it not been that outside people supported them as much as those in Estacada. And there was more drunkenness than since the saloons came in."

A letter from a former Eagle Creek resident, Andrew W. King, of Hood River was read by Mr. Devine, opposing county division.
