CROWD ENJOYS FOURTH

Safe and Sane celebration pleasing to All.

MUCH CREDIT DUE FIREMEN
They planned and successfully carried out every detail—Ball Games, Races and dances, features.

From the standpoint of enjoyment, the celebration of the Fourth under the auspices of the fire department of Estacada, was one of the most successful ever held here. Probably between two and three thousand people, many from Portland, attended and notwithstanding the big crowd, the best of order prevailed and the celebrators entered into the spirit of the day with zest. It was a sane and safe Fourth no accident marring the pleasure of the people.

Estacada was gay in bunting and flags, practically all the business houses flying the national colors. Across Broadway, between Second and Third streets, swung a huge sign "Please vote for Cascade County", the work of two enthusiasts, A. E. Sparks and R. M. Standish. The sign received much favorable comment from outsiders.

A contributing feature was the good weather. For once our old friend J. Pluvius kept his sprinkling cart away from the Fourth and the atmosphere was mild. The day began with the time honored salute of guns which roused the small boys and sent them, fire crackers in hand, to the park. It also roused a lot of the elder folks who turned over and had another nap before breakfast.

Currinsville Band Pleases.
The Currinsville band of over twenty pieces appeared early and throughout the day was generous with its music which was much enjoyed. The band played at the ball games and later at the park where the speaking and races were held. Other music was furnished by the excellent orchestra of Estacada musicians who were at the pavilion during the afternoon and evening dances, conducted by the firemen.

The baseball game between Estacada and Springwater during the forenoon was won by Estacada 8 to 4. In the afternoon Springwater with Long in the box defeated the Salem Woolen Mill of Portland 7 to 3.

Brownell, orator of Day.
Senator George C. Brownell of Oregon City delivered a fine speech at the band stand during the forenoon. He made a progressive talk thoroughly in sympathy with the times, tracing the advancement of the United States, from the time of the colonies down to the present. Patriotism and loyalty to the country was the theme and an earnest endorsement of progress. Touching upon political aspects, he declared that the voter was becoming more and more a devotee of principles rather than partisanship and said that not party name but what the party stands for, is the controlling influence today.

During the afternoon a number of races were run off, Roy Morrow acting as starter and William Perry as judge. There were many entries for each event. Ennis Townsend of Estacada won the 100 yard dash and the slim mans race; Krigbaum and Wooster took the three-legged race; Leonard Mayfield the race for boys and girls under 9; Morley Brown for boys under 16; Ruth Calif, the ladies race.

Fat man with wooden leg.
One of the amusing features was the fat mans race which was won by a Portland heavyweight, who in addition to carrying beef, sprinted on a wooden leg. He distanced the other rotund racers and breathlessly pocketed the \$1 prize. Two of the contestants fell down and had to be assisted to their feet.

The details of the celebration were carried out faithfully by President Fred Jorg and his committees. A goodly profit was cleared for the benefit of the treasury. The firemen donated their time and work and the net profit will be held

for improvement of the service. Throughout the day the best of order was maintained by Marshal Ames and his deputies. A year ago there was considerable disorder, on account of blind pigs. That undesirable institution having been cleaned out, there was little work for the police this year.

LEAGUE PITCHER TOUCHED UP
Springwater with Easterly in box, is beaten 8 to 4 in morning game—Springwater wins second game.

With Nick Williams' star finger Easterly of the Portland Northwestern club, in the box, Springwater looked as if it had a win in the morning game of the Fourth. But Estacada gingered up stronger than ever and hopped to Mr. Easterly for a total of 14 hits and 8 runs, while Springwater was harvesting 10 hits out of which they cashed 4 runs. It was some game and the bugs who filled the grand stand and overflowed it, had one swell time.

"Fiddler" Bronson wasn't up to his usual form, but he was so good that his opponent, the leaguer, had a wholesome respect for him and T. Rankin, ex-league umpire, who officiated at both games, asked a lot of questions about the Fiddler and said he was going to talk to Williams about the phenom Estacada has. So it is possible that the Fiddler's manly chest may be covered by a Portland uniform one of these days.

All kinds of Plays.
The game was, in some respects a mixed pickle affair. There were brilliant plays, bonthead stunts, heavy hitting, strikeouts galore, clever base running and some that wasn't,—in fact it was a game that kept interest going all the way. It was for blood and sixty percent of the gate receipts and both teams worked their collective heads off.

Estacada's scoring machine started in the first round after two were out. Cap Levitt, first up, singled, Heitsman's grounder was booted and Hewitt came through with a two sacker to left scoring Cap. Schultz' sizzler to second was fumbled and both Heisy and Hewitt flied home. Schultz then swiped second and scored when Balstzer cuffed Smith's smash. Backstop Boylan tomahawked Smithy when he tried to steal second.

Smithy opened the third with a single and Stubbs beat out a well placed lunt; Townsend was out on an infield fly, but Doc Douglass banged both home on a double to right. Cap Levitticus whiffed. Our last runs came in the seventh. Doc Douglass began with a single but was caught at second giving Cap a life. Heitsman breezed but Hewitt two bagged landing Cap on third. Both scored on Schultz' whack to center fence.

Enemy grabs off three.
In the second round Boylan doubled and reached third on a passed ball. Long skied and Bittner was ribbed by the Fiddler. Then Howard Smith struck out and Easterly lifted a high one back of second which Schultz fearing a collision with Cap, muffed. Two came in and Easterly scored later on Dibble's single. In the fourth Easterly's double a fielders choice and a mixup on the line let the leaguer in. Several times after that the Springwater lads had the bases filled, but brilliant support stopped the runs. Schultz made a great catch of Easterly's drive in the seventh which saved a run. Stubbs also saved two runs by slugging a hot one back of first. Boylan, Balstzer and Long started for the visitors. Easterly fanned 10 to 6 for Bronson.
