OBJECT TO DIVISION

Two hundred out of 1,400 voters file objection

OREGON CITY BACK OF DEAL

Prominent Live Wire says Cascade is too valuable to go. Real reason why Oregon City is concerned

Two hundred seventeen out of a total of about 1,400 voters of the territory proposed to be included within Cascade county, have signed a protest against division. The thrilling news of the filing of this paper at Salem, last week, is supplied by Oregon City, whose Commercial club came to the rescue and like Sheridan at Winchester in the person of Promotion Manager Freytag, arrived on the scene just ten minutes before the expiration of the time for registering remonstrances. According to later information, the protest was improperly drawn, so a Salem attorney was requisitioned to draw up another set of objections, to which he copied in typewriter the signatures to the original remonstrance and filed this with the secretary of state, over the objections of Chairman C. W. Devore and Attorney E. W. Bartlett, members of the Cascade county executive committee who contended that the paper was not the one signed by the objectors.

Reason for Opposition.
Putting aside the question of legality let us again refer to the account of the heroes return from Salem, Mr. Freytag, who appeared before the Commercial club and through O. D. Eby, Publicity Manager, reported. During the general rejoicing at Oregon City at the same meeting, by the way, which witnessed the passing of the town from the main line of the Southern Pacific--Mr. McBain, former president of the Live Wires, told the real reason why division is opposed at Oregon City. According to the Courier:

Mr. McBain pointed out to the club that the day would come when eastern Clackamas would be a valuable country in its water power sites, and that our people should get wise to the loss that a division of the county would mean in the coming years.

Weeping of Crocodile Tears.

That's the meat in the cocoon, the Ethiopian in the woodpile. It will be remembered during the three memorable meetings citizens of Estacada had with the Live Wires and the Commercial club that the tenor of all the speeches of the Oregon City contingent and their supporters, who have signed the remonstrance, was that Cascade county couldn't support itself; its people meant all right, of course, and nobody blamed them for desiring to have a government of their own and so far as Oregon City was concerned, it had no serious objection, if it were not for fear that former residents of dear old Clackamas, would stagger under increased taxation and would go into bankruptcy and simply couldn't toddle along. Of course, said the Oregon City speakers, so far as the western part of Clackamas, was concerned it would be a good idea to be rid of East Clackamas, but pause, reflect, and listen! wouldn't it be better for us all to stay under the banner of old Clackamas and let Oregon City look out for us?

Two Severe Bumps.
All this talk of bankruptcy, higher taxes, bridge building, roads; all the tearful pleadings to stay with old Clackamas and not wander into strange fields of finance, were set at naught, by the shrewd Mr. McBain, who finally revealed that the reason he and some of his business associates opposed division, was because Oregon City needs East Clackamas' taxes to help keep Oregon City on the map. A selfish view, maybe, but what would you? Isn't Mr. McBain a good business man? He is.

Possibly the Commercial club was moved to sit down on division, because it has just heard with foreboding, that the town had been made a whistling post by the Southern Pacific, "Main line trains", wails The Enterprise, "in both directions will pass up Oregon City and the present track into the town will be used only for an electric railway, if at all." And if that isn't enough, says the Enterprise, cars of the Canby Molalla electric line will not pass through Oregon City. Concluding the Enterprise asks "what are we going to do about it?"

How to be Happy.
The Progress doesn't know. It believes, however, that Oregon City would be happier, if it had generously agreed to division of the county, and had devoted its efforts to suppressing local political agitators who were accused, in a report to the Live Wires with having lost a big paper mill to the town; it would feel better if it had spent more time trying to save the Southern Pacific to the town.

Not long ago a warning was sent out to the residents of Oregon City to scrape the moss off their house roofs. It was said the moss was a menace to public safety. A good many people are mildly curious to know whether the volunteers who scraped the moss off their roofs, performed a like service in mutual scraping of each other's backs.

Tuesday evening Evangelist Brooke will give his famous illustrated lecture "The Story of the Other Wise Man" at the Boney Theatre, which will afford to the citizens of Estacada and vicinity an evening of high class entertainment, and will be a fitting close to the evangelists work in Estacada.

UNKNOWN IS DROWNED

Body of stranger found floating in Clackamas.

SACK OF ROCKS TIED TO NECK

No suspicion of foul play entertained by coroner—Man had been in water probably about two weeks.

Wearing a pair of steel bowed spectacles and with a flour sack partly filled with rocks, tied about his neck, the body of an unknown man, was found by a Mr. Rubley floating opposite the pavilion in the Clackamas river, last Thursday afternoon. Coroner Wilson thought the case plain suicide and held no inquest, taking the same action as he did in the case of J. C. LaFrance found up river.

The body was dressed in a dark suit. The hat was tied by a necktie to the sack of rocks. No means of identification were found. The man was apparently about 50 years old, 5 feet 9 inches tall, iron grey hair weight 180, smooth shaven, left thumb missing and scars of an operation on the abdomen. The remains were interred by Undertaker Henthorn at county expense.
