### FINDS POTTERY CLAY

F. J. Harkenrider has valuable deposit on farm.

### SAMPLES STAND THE FIRE TEST

Borings show, so far, 500 foot bed of unknown depth—May be a big thing for Estacada.

F. J. Harkenrider, owner of an 87 acre farm a quarter of a mile northeast of Estacada's city limits, has discovered what he believes to be an excellent quality of pottery clay, which may prove to be good fire clay as well. He has determined its practicality as pottery clay and tests made in a blacksmith's forge, indicate it will be available as fire clay, for the hottest fire, did not effect it apparently.

As soon as Mr. Harkenrider has finished threshing, he will take samples to Portland for analysis and tests.

Borings with a 4 foot augur for a distance of 500 feet indicate a big bank of the clay at an unknown depth. It extends along the banks of Curriu creek. Tests made in the bed of the creek show the deposit extends under it.

Mr. Harkenrider fashioned two cups which he sun-dried and then baked in the kitchen stove. The pottery was hard and serviceable. The clay is bluish gray in color and of fine quality.

### Plenty of work for men at P.R.L.&P. Camp "5"

Ernest Cushman, employed as a carpenter at Camp 5 seven miles from Bull run, where the P. R. L. & P. Co. is putting in a dam, was here Sunday visiting friends and returned to work Monday morning.

Mr. Cushman says there is demand for men at the camp, ordinary laborers receiving \$2.50 a day, carpenters assistants \$2.75, carpenters \$3.50 to 4.50 and rock drillers from \$3 to \$4.50.

At present there are about 250 men at work and all who apply are taken on. The work will continue until next summer, when it is understood at the camp, the company will begin power plant work about twenty miles above Cazadero. Cushman says he expects to remain with the contractors steadily, for there are chances of promotion if a man proves himself competent and steady.

Max Klaetsch and Ethel Dwyer, residents of Estacada, surprised their friends, last week, by quietly leaving with the bride's mother for Portland, where they were married. They returned Friday and the relatives were then told. The news spread and in the evening a number of small boys and some not so small serenaded the couple. Mr. and Mrs. Klaetsch have begun housekeeping.

### Mattoon glad Live Wires Have settled Bridge Deal.

Pleased because the Live Wires of Oregon City have settled the location of the proposed county bridge at Barton, County Commissioner W. H. Mattoon, says he hopes they will go ahead, now, and build it.

"The county court" said Mr. Mattoon, "has had its hands full trying to maintain the present bridges and build a new one or two. There doesn't appear to be any funds at hand for any more, but as the Live Wires appear to have things all settled, of course, I'm glad our problems of finance have been solved. Now, if the boys will arrange for the money to build the Barton bridge and go ahead and build it, so much the better."

The Live Wires want the railroads to contribute the funds for the bridges needed, according to the Enterprise. The Wires heard the arguments of Eagle Creek for the bridge, but turned them down.

### KURASCH GETS LICENSE

By vote of 3 to 2 he secures Saloon Permit.

### JONES WOULD REDUCE LICENSE

Thinks \$1,000 each for two saloons, or \$2,000 for one wise—Sewer plans are completed.

By a vote of 3 to 2, the city council, Tuesday evening granted a saloon licence to William Kurasch, Jones and Underwood opposing and by a vote of 4 to 1, rejected the application of George Venke, Jones opposing. Incidentally Alderman Jones made a speech or "spiel" as he called it discussing saloon finances and showing how at the present licence rate, only one saloon could exist and the city would lose if one quit. His remedy, which was embodied in the ordinance introduced last night is to reduce licences to \$1,000 and allow two or make it \$2,000 for one saloon. In that way the city saves \$500, Jones explains.

Cross & Hammond's bill of \$125 for legal services during the bootlegging days, was turned down. Mills and Hawkins voting to pay it. The council offered to compromise for \$75, but the lawyers threaten suit unless \$125 is paid.

### Sewer and Pound discussed.

Engineer Noble was ordered to come here to run levels and establish the sewer grade, the stakes of the former engineer not showing the depth of excavation. Mayor Reed said arrangements should be made for cement and sand for joining the sewer pipe and bids were asked on two tons of sand and one ton of cement. The manholes at four street intersections were ordered and the contractor was ordered to buy a suitable pipe and connecting the sewer at the river. About 50 feet will be required.

The council ordered the Recorder to arrange for the rental of a corral for a city pound to take care of live stock which rooms at large between 6 p.m. and 7 a.m. The new ordinance goes into effect Saturday.

### Estacada Ball team quits: Poor attendance, Reason.

After playing a bang-up article of base ball all season, winning 11 out of 15 games played and tying one, Estacada's baseball team, has disbanded. Lack of patronage is the reason assigned. The team quits, however, owing no money, a condition prominent by its absence, heretofore. Its members have received little or no pay this season, but played faithfully and gained honor for themselves and a lot of excellent advertising for Estacada.

In the two seasons past, the hundreds of men employed at River Mill and on other construction work, attended the games. This year the work being finished the team had to depend upon the town-people for support. A number of faithful fans stayed with the team from start to finish and went down into their pockets to make up the deficits. Two dances were given and the proceeds went to pay for equipment and fixing the grounds. It became evident some time ago that if the attendance did not increase, the team must quit. It takes about \$18 actual expenses to pull off a game and the attendance averaged about \$15. Portland clubs demand a guarantee of \$12 for carfare and lunch for twelve men.

Umpires charged nothing and the players aside from about \$5 each, received nothing for the season. Nevertheless they were behind their manager, to a man in a determination to close out of debt. When the debts were finally paid off they decided it was useless to risk deficits farther. It is a matter of regret the team has disbanded. It furnished good entertainment for its patrons and beat Portland's best amateur clubs.

### Honeyman's win Game.

Mr. Dillard of the Honeyman tribe was wiggling better than when he last appeared here, so Estacada shot the chutes, 8 to 2. Fiddler Bronson was pretty fair, himself, but some of our hascrunning gammed the cards and the Fiddler hadn't a chance to pull out. A pretty good crowd, many from Portland, saw the game. One of the features was "Slats" Morton's hitting and fielding. "Slats" singled twice in four times up and accepted four chances without a miscue.
