Wonder when that block between the depot and the bank on Broadway, is going to be macadamized. Seems as if everything was all arranged a month or two ago, but nothing has been done.

The Courier of Oregon City wants to know when the expert called upon to examine the municipal books, is going to report. A good many people in the county would like to know when the experts are going to go over the county books.

Citizens of Oregon City are threatening to call on Governor West to take a hand in law enforcement at a park near the town where, it is claimed, beer is sold to minors on Sunday. Several ministers are taking a hand in the protest.

With Governor West on the job, appearing in his specialty "Cleaning the Town", Portland is undergoing a big upheaval over the social problem and before the governor ends this fight, which he says, may extend until he retires from office, a lot of toes are going to be pinched. Those who are standing behind the methods of government in Portland are under a handicap, because their own vice commission has filed a report showing conditions to be shocking. Hence while they may cry "grandstand, notoriety and free advertising" at the governor, the effect is destroyed, because the governor has made good in other cleanups at Huntington and Redmond and the Milwaukee roadhouse. He says he proposes to make good at Portland, if it takes two years. The city, according to the commission, is over-run with members of the underworld, the scarlet women and their consorts having invaded respectable neighborhoods everywhere and caused most of the hotels and lodging houses, to be labeled "immoral." Mayor Rushlight, during the conference with the governor, suggested the only known practical remedy, segregation of the undesirable element. This is generally violently opposed by the theorists who call it going into partnership with vice. But the fact remains that where the well meaning but impractical theorist banishes the segregated district, the social monster extends its slimy tentacles all over the city. Official corruption becomes more general and a condition arises such as Portland now faces.

Gunsaulus gets contract for school building job.
James Gunsaulus of Portland secured the contract for furnishing and installing the fire escapes and kalsomining the walls of the Estacada school building.

Mention was made on August 8 in the Progress of the fact the school board had called for bids on fire escapes, wood and kalsomining and notices were tacked up by the board. But local painters evidently didn't see the notices or didn't care to bid, for Gunsaulus was the only bidder. There were three bidders for the wood contract, which was awarded to Max Klatsch at \$2.80 a cord.

Gunsaulus is making good headway with the work. Electric lights are being installed in the building by order of the board.
