Hop Crop This Year Best in Both Quality and Quantity. Dallas-Hop picking has opened-in

this county in the yard owned by C. G. Coad and Charles Bilyeu, about a mile to the west of this city, and before the week is over, harvesting of the hop crop will be in full swing all over the county. Never before have the hops of the

county shown so well as they do at the present time. The quality is far above the average, and the yield is also large, the damage caused by the heavy rains of a week ago having been nearly wholly repaired. Barring the possibility of steady rains for the next two weeks, every indication points to the best hop crop in the history of the county. If it rains, picking will be delayed in many of the vards.

Much of the crop of the county has een contracted for, nearly all of the smaller yards having disposed of their yield during the winter. The contract price averages 20 cents. An effort is being made this year to hold the pickers down to picking fairly clean.
