## ESTACADA GOES "DRY"

Judge Campbell decides against City Charter

### SALOONS SHUT THEIR DOORS

Case is to go to Supreme court—City loses funds and improvements will likely be stopped.

With a suddenness that jarred, Judge Campbell of the circuit court entered a decision against the Estacada charter, last Tuesday, that put the local option law in effect here, shut two saloons and by causing a refund of licence money, left the city without funds to carry on public improvement. Until the assessment for this year is available next May or June, the municipality must economize.

At the city council meeting, Tuesday night, a report was made by Attorney Claude Devore, who appeared with G. B. Dimick for the defendant saloonmen, Meister and Venke, indicted by the grand jury a few days ago under the election of 1910 when Estacada precinct went dry. It is alleged that Governor West was back of the proposition, having been appealed to by a committee of citizens. The case went to trial on a charge of violation of the local option law and after the state had proved the sale of liquor, a contention admitted by the defense, the court heard arguments on the question of whether Estacada could regulate the liquor traffic under its charter.

#### How Court Decided.

Judge Campbell held that at the time of the granting of Estacada's charter by the legislature of 1905, the city was exempt from the local option law and had a right to control liquor selling within its limits, but when the question was voted on in 1910, that as the local option law is an enabling act, the passage of the local option law, as far as Estacada is concerned, dated not from June 24, 1904 when the governor proclaimed its passage, but from Nov. 1910, the last election. This being a later enactment than the Estacada charter, repealed the charter and put local option in effect.

#### May Appeal Case.

The saloon men, it is announced, will appeal to the supreme court, which has already in the Medford case reversed the lower court, which held precisely as has Judge Campbell. They profess confidence that they will win. It is possible, too that a special election will be called for a vote Nov. 5 in the town of Estacada, under the Home Rule law, which gives incorporated towns the right to regulate liquor selling.

### Much improvement Made at the Garfield School.

Progressive up-to-date citizens of Garfield have made great improvement in their school house. Supervisor H. M. James says that changes made, make conditions almost ideal. All cross lights have been eliminated by placing all the windows so that lights come only over the pupils' left shoulders. The building has been painted outside and inside, walls are tinted with restful colors, new cloakrooms are provided and a McPherson heating and ventilating furnace installed. The latter will afford warm pure air. A new well is being dug, maps and a new dictionary will soon be added.

Garfield has come to the conclusion that their children are entitled to the best school equipment. One of the best teachers of the county, Miss Rica Anderson, is employed.

### Irvin's celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary.

With three of their children and several grandchildren as guests at dinner, Mr. and Mrs. John P. Irvin celebrated their golden wedding at their home in Estacada, August 29. Both Mr. and Mrs. Irvin are in good health and received the congratulations of their relatives and friends and wishes for many more years of wedded happiness.

They were married August 29, 1862 in Independence, Mo. The town was in the possession of the

southern forces and the famous Quantrell was in command. After the war Mr. and Mrs. Irvin came west arriving in Oregon in 1875 where they have since made their home. Three of their children, John T. Frank and J. A. and their families were present. A daughter Mrs. Alice Folsom lives in Montana. The elder Irvin has thirteen grandchildren and two great grandchildren the latter residing in Montana.

### Estacada prize Baby did not go to Fair.

Harold Bronson the 3 year old Estacada boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Neil Bronson, who was declared the best formed child in his class in Clackamas county, was not exhibited at the state fair. In the first place his parents never were notified by the judges and first knowledge of the result came to them through a newspaper account, too late to afford a chance to make the trip.

Regarding the dozen or more babies exhibited here, nothing is known of the decision of the Oregon City judges. Superintendent James called to find out and was told the cards had been destroyed and no record kept of the decision. From the standpoint of the award of prizes the county show was a fizzle, despite the interest taken by the mothers who exhibited their children and assisted in making the district fairs a success. Some of the mothers believe that at least the courtesy of notice of results might have been extended.

### Shibley wins first prize with Bird House at Fair.

Everett Shibley, a Springwater boy won first prize at the state fair at Salem, for bird houses. The one he exhibited was a novelty in that 43 pieces of different Oregon wood were used, no pieces being duplicated except the shingles and the corner posts.

He received as award, a full blooded Berkshire pig. It is the belief of Superintendent H. M. James that Sam Barr would have won second prize for mechanical toys with the motor which he exhibited at the Estacada juvenile fair. His ingenious machine should have a walkaway over a windmill which won second. The first prize was won by a Wilsonville boy who exhibited a motor and pump.

### County Court may Employ Experts on County Books.

The suggestion by The Progress that the county books haven't been subjected to expert accountants for a good many years, bore fruit, last week, when the county court took up the proposition and received proposals from experts. The experts want \$10 a day, however, and don't place a time limit on the job, so the court is rather undecided what to do.

County Commissioner Mattoor is of the opinion that the books should be examined. "Since I've been connected with the court," he said "no experts have examined the books. I don't know when they were last looked into. They may be all right, probably are, but letting things slide along in that fashion, year after year, isn't business, so I'm for an expert accounting."

The court turned down a petition for a saloon license at Clackamas and allowed one at Wilsonville. A road from Barton to Logan, over which there has been some controversy was ordered.

## SCHOOLS OPEN MONDAY

Registration continues for the High School.

### MANY OUTSIDERS ARE COMING

Building thoroughly renovated from top to bottom and improvements made—Eight instructors in charge.

When the bell at 8.30 Monday morning summons from their vacations the pupils of this town and district, they will find a spic and span school house, cleaned from top to bottom and better equipped than it was last year. The painting and kalsomining has been finished, the floors scrubbed and re-oiled, the building wired for electric lights and shower baths for the athletic department, installed in the basement. Janitor A. J. Mills has done his work well.

Eight instructors will be ready and many of the pupils of the high school will take the course in agriculture. Practically half have already registered and had seats assigned. All have elected agriculture.

Principal Ford says that high school will begin at 9 and continue until 3.30 each day with an hour for lunch. The first bell in the morning will ring at 8.30 the second at 8.55. In the afternoon the first will ring at 12.45; the second at 12.55.

It is estimated the total registration will be 240, of which 40 will be high school students.

### Garfield Basket Social To Begin at 8 o'clock.

Preparations are practically completed for the basket social and dance of the Garfield Country club, next Saturday evening. Big bonfires will light up the grounds and the social begins at 8 o'clock. The award of the cake for the most popular lady, after the votes are counted, should be finished by 9 o'clock and from that time until midnight there will be dancing.

An impression is abroad that the affair includes a basket picnic during the day, but such is not the case, President Hunt states. The entertainment begins in the evening. There is every indication there will be a good crowd, providing the weather is favorable. The funds are to be devoted to the new addition to the club house. Arrangements have already been made for the 14,000 feet of lumber.

### An overheated stovepipe Burns house to Ground.

An overheated stovepipe which caused the wall paper of the kitchen of H. F. Blair's house in Garfield to catch fire, resulted in a blaze last Thursday, which razed the house and consumed most of the household furniture. It is said there was no insurance.

Mrs. Blair was alone in the house when the fire started. She was ironing at the time and the kitchen fire being low she placed several sticks of pitch in the stove. Immediately the pipe began burning out and the heat caused the wall paper to catch fire. Mrs. Blair tried to extinguish the flames and failing summoned a neighbor, Mr. Patterson, who had been looking after the farm work, during the absence of Mr. Blair who is east on account of the death of a relative.

Patterson hurried to the house, from his home across the road, but the fire had gained headway and by the time other neighbors arrived, it was beyond control. A number of household articles were saved, but the bulk was burned. To complicate matters the pump refused to work, so water had to be carried from a distance.

By great efforts the neighbors were able to save the woodshed adjoining the house.
