Commenting upon the boldness of the Cubans, Mexicans and Central Americans in killing Americans and destroying their property, The Oregon City Enterprise wonders why it is that the Latin Americans dislike the United States. Because the United States allows the greasers to do whatever they please to its citizens without fear of reprisal. If an English, German, French or any foreign citizen suffers outrage at the hands of the Latins, the latter are either promptly shot or made to pay an indemnity that jars the custom house clear to its foundation. But Uncle Sam, with his Monroe Doctrine sentimentalism, is an easy mark. The greaser, like the Turk, respects only those whom he fears. An iron hand laid on smartly will cure the "dislike" the Enterprise wonders about.

**As to City Water.**  
Elsewhere appears a communication from a housewife, calling attention to the bad condition of the city water and asking for a remedy. The Progress while realizing that all the lady says is true, can suggest no method, offhand, for bettering conditions. Mayor Reed, early in the spring submitted a plan for diverting Wade creek above the Stubbe ranch, and conveying the water in drain tile, covered the entire distance to the intake. This plan would assist materially, but would not cure, unless the drain were extended to the source of the creek. For, above the Stubbe tract the creek flows through several barnyards and during rains, the wash from the hill sides would pollute the stream, just as it does now. It would cost a good deal to make the improvement and funds are not available. But, in the opinion of the Progress, something should be done, before the winter rains begin. Perhaps a filter at the intake would help temporarily, but sooner or later, means must be had to furnish Estacada with an unfauling source of pure water. It is among the first consideration of a wise municipal government.

If you are curious to know why socialism walks with lagging feet, a peep at a vile leaflet attacking Ex president Roosevelt and his family during the recent visit of Mr. Roosevelt in Portland, will serve as an indicator. This particular screed bearing the name of Thos. Burns as author and approved by seven men alleging they are socialists, is the limit in obscenity and indecency. It is couched in the language of the gutter-snipe. So far the socialists of Portland have not disowned the paterfamilias of the leaflet, so it may be assumed they approve it. It is to be hoped that Portland will arrest every person connected with the preparation and distribution of the leaflet and send them to prison, if there's law to warrant it. If not, one should be executed at once.
