The attempted killing of Former  
President Roosevelt at Milwaukee  
last Monday, by a maniac, caused  
an almost universal feeling of hor-  
ror, the only exception, so far as  
known, being at a meeting of the  
socialists at Portland, the same  
brood, by the way, which circulate  
an infamous pamphlet against  
Mr. Roosevelt, when he visited  
Portland recently. At this meeting,  
it is alleged, the news was received  
with snickers and statements that  
Mr. Roosevelt had probably framed  
up the attempted murder. This,  
too, in the face of the fact that the  
stricken leader of the Bull Moose  
party, is not yet out of danger of  
death.

**What Single Tax Does.**  
The single taxers aren't quoting  
from the Canadian newspapers  
which are giving accounts these  
days of the fiasco in Alberta. The  
Calgary Herald in giving a history  
of the trial of the single tax says:  
"The result has been disastrous  
to a number of Alberta towns. The  
finances are well nigh paralyzed.  
Single tax as applied to their land  
on any reasonable basis of assess-  
ment whatever does not come near  
to supplying their actual financial  
needs. Public works have had to  
be stopped; public service is de-  
moralized; public officials cannot  
get their money, and even school  
teachers have been held up for  
their salaries because the munic-  
ipalities have been unable to estab-  
lish a new basis of revenue."

baked beans 5; sauer kraut and  
wienies, 10; potato salad, 5; pie 5;  
cake 5; coffee 5; pickles 1 cent.

**Would Avoid Accidents.**
