Sheriff Mass Says Clerk's Office Made this Miscue.

DIDN'T TAX RAILROAD ENOUGH

Company Agrees to Pay But Claims Discount - Estacada District Recovers \$3,938, Result of Mrs. Bates' Work.

After discovering \$1,319, belonging to Estacada school district, had been turned in to District 105, Sheriff Mass found another miscue in Oregon City book-keeping, as a result of which Estacada district has \$2,619 more.

Prodded by Mrs. Sara Bates, school clerk, who on a recent visit learned, to her astonishment, that the district had only \$132 in the treasury, a total of \$3,938 has been found and turned back by the sheriff.

The first item of \$1,319 was a miscue by Sheriff Mass, who had turned it over to District 105. To Mrs. Bates, he explained, Monday, that the \$2,619 still coming, was an error of the county clerk's office, and it happened this way:

Where the Clerk Erred.
The clerk's office wrote down only a tenth of the taxes which the O. R. L. & P. should have paid. The railroad company upon being notified of the miscue, a few days ago, agreed to pay what is due the county, but claims a discount of 3 per cent amounting to \$328.27. It says it is not to blame for clerical errors and the county accordingly allows the discount. The total amount the railroad should have paid, less the 3 per cent, is \$2,947.37.

Where Estacada district suffers by reason of this error is that this money, which would have been used to take up outstanding warrants and thus saved the district some money in interests.
About \$140 More to Turn In.
Sheriff Mass thinks he will have about \$140 more to turn in at a later date, that amount being delinquent at present. He told Mrs. Bates he intended the district should have all that is coming to it, so Mrs. Bates came home and reported to the board Monday.

She also stated there are outstanding warrants of \$2,230.13 and the money from the railroad company will pay this off and leave a margin. Since she received the \$1,319, referred to in last week's report, she has paid some bills, leaving \$1,160.45. In conclusion Mrs. Bates reports:

"This will carry us through part of December. Then I will have to issue warrants until our special tax money comes in in March, but the prospect is good at present that when I turn over my books to my successor, next June, there will be no outstanding warrants. Our sinking fund now is \$1,382.58."

School District Votes A 7 Mills Special Tax

About thirty-five taxpayers and residents attended the meeting of the school district, Monday evening, at the Estacada school house, where the question of voting a special tax for the ensuing year was threshed over and 7 mills voted. The vote was close, 19 to 16. The tax for last year was 12 mills. The 7 mills will yield about \$7,000.

Eagle Creek Athletic Club Organized: Basketball Team

An enthusiastic group of athletes at Eagle Creek have formed an Athletic Club with 20 charter members, to which additions are being made every week. Wilburn hall has been fitted up as a gymnasium with paraphernalia, including wrestling mat, boxing gloves, basketball equipment, etc. and practice is going on regularly. The regular meeting night is Saturday. A basketball team will shortly be put in the field and will make all

contenders go some from the start. Among those trying for the team are Elmer Anderson, Lloyd Trolinger, M. C. Glover, C. O. Neill, A. Still, Leslie Strawl, W. Still, Jack Saunders, Will and Art Smith. Classes in boxing and wrestling have been organized. Eagle Creek's example along this line, might be emulated with profit by Estacada, which has much talent in athletics. Springwater already has crack basketball and baseball teams.

ESTACADA DEFEATS HILLSBORO

Locals Playing Great Football, Make Touchdown Score Standing at Close, 6 to 0.

Playing real football and keeping the strong Hillsboro High team on the defensive, Estacada High won last Saturday 6 to 0.

Within 5 minutes after the play began, two forward passes, Morton to Evans, a blocked kick by Keith, and Eyan's quick recovery of the ball, gave the touchdown, the only one of the game, Morton failed to kick goal.

The gridiron was a sea of mud and the players were caked from head to foot and soaked to the buff. The play, however, was as fast as the condition of the field would permit, and the ball was in the Hillsboro territory most of the time.

Estacada goal was never threatened but Hillsboro's was, twice. In both instances magnificent defense coupled with luck, kept Estacada from scoring.

Estacada kicked off and the ball was lost on a fumble after two downs. Fellows, Womer and Woodie were tried on the line for small gains and then two forward passes, Evans catching them beautifully, placed the ball within a foot of the Hillsboro goal. Here the enemy made a desperate stand and the ball was lost on downs. Immediately Hillsboro tried to kick out of danger, but Keith who played a wonderful game at guard, broke through and blocked, the ball going over the fence. Again Hillsboro tried a kick and again the fighting Keith smashed through guard and tackle and blocked, the ball sailing back of the line. Like a flash Evans was after it and shaking off a tackler he fell on the pigskin for a touchdown.

From then on Hillsboro fought to prevent another touchdown the half closing with the ball on Hillsboro's 10 yard line.

In the second half Hillsboro by straight line bucks, using their full back, worked the ball to Estacada's 25 yard line, where it was lost on downs. From then on Estacada never was in danger. Graham, though crippled, played full on defense and end on offense. Womer, Fellows and Woodie made good gains, but the forward pass, a fake placement and runs by Morton were best ground gainers. Morgan, Havens, Bartlett, Harriman and Keith did good defensive work. The improvement of the whole team was great. They play a return game at Hillsboro Saturday.

Springwater Beats All Stars.

Springwater opened the basketball season last Saturday night with a big noise in Dodge hall and dressed the All Star Portland H. S. students 30 to 27. The game was fast and well played but was somewhat marred by rough work on the part of the Portland boys. The first half was easy money for Springwater, ending 15 to 7 in their favor. Smith turned his ankle and was replaced by Wilcox in the middle of the game.

PARKER SHOT IN HEAD

Estacadan Visiting Sandy, is Victim of Saloon Row.

J. FRIEL, ALLEGED ASSAILANT

Stagedriver is Turned Loose as Well as Other Roysterers at Hearing—Parker Goes to See Sheriff.

During a brawl at Sandy, Tuesday morning, R. P. Parker, a former saloon man of Estacada, was shot it is alleged by a stagedriver, Jerry Friel, one of the roysterers in one of the three all night saloons. Parker narrowly escaped death, the bullet plowing a furrow along his scalp, causing much bleeding.

Six or seven men, including Friel were rounded up and a hearing held, but the whole party turned loose, only Parker being fined \$25 for hitting a liverman after he was shot. Parker went to Oregon City yesterday morning to sign a complaint against Friel and has not returned.

According to Parker's story and corroborated in part by witnesses, he was drinking in a saloon where a free for all took place. Friel pulled a gun and threatened to kill someone and it is alleged followed Parker to the hotel where he shot him. He then ran. Parker, bleeding badly and dazed, staggered across the street to a livery barn, inquiring the way to the hotel. The man ordered him out whereupon Parker knocked him down. A doctor later attended to Parker's wound and he came home Tuesday night.

LaFrance Estate Settled.

C. W. Devore, attorney in the LaFrance estate, was at Portland last week, making final settlement. About \$15,000 life insurance was paid to the widow. LaFrance's body, badly decomposed, was found up the Clackamas river, last summer, by a party of fishermen. The coroner decided his death was an accident the evidence indicating it was the result of a fall from a high bank. The dead man's fishing rod, broken, was found near him and the body was fully dressed, a fish basket being strapped to the shoulders.
