PAVILION BURNS DOWN

Fire Probably of Incendiary Origin, Say Fireman

IS DISCOVERED ABOUT 7:30

Hose Breaks Preventing Effective Fighting—P. R. L. & P. to Put up Better Building in the Spring.

Fire, probably of incendiary origin, last Saturday night about 7:30 broke out in the Estacada Pavilion and totally consumed the structure. Effective fire fighting was prevented by parting of the hose which was stretched four blocks. The P. R. L. & P. will rebuild in the spring.

The blaze was discovered, it is stated, by "Budd" Califf of Cazadero, who saw smoke issuing from the building. He was at the depot awaiting a train home. He spread the alarm and assisted the firemen in running out the carts and fighting the flames.

Dick Kimmel one of the first firemen to reach the building, found it already ablaze inside. He found, also, under the floor at one side, a blazing pile of kindling wood, which convinces him that the fire had been set.

By the time the department had the hose stretched from the hydrant at Second and Broad streets, the fire was under good headway, but even then, the building might have been saved, had not the hose parted. Before it was re-coupled, the interior of the pavilion was in flames and the firemen barely had time to remove a piano, belonging to H. M. Kruse, before the roof fell.

Agent is Investigating.

A special agent of the P. R. L. & P. is making an investigation and declares he believes an incendiary is responsible both for the pavilion fire and the one which destroyed the Cazadero bridge, last summer.

The pavilion was constructed about six years ago by J. W. Reed and cost, complete, about \$1,200. It was 40 by 100 feet and was used for dancing and for basketball games. It was the resort of the excursion crowds in the summer time.

Bigger and Better Building.

The loss of the building, probably does away with basketball at the high school this year, for the railroad company is not expected to rebuild until spring, in time for the excursions.

To The Progress an official of the company stated yesterday that the building will be bigger and better. An effort is being made to have it constructed so that public meetings may be held and plays given. The ceiling will be built higher so that basketball games may be played to better advantage.

The fire caused the transfer of the Thanksgiving dance last night to Elliott's hall at Eagle Creek.

Rules of Parcels Post.

Postmaster A. N. Johnson has received instructions from the postal department regarding the installation of the parcels post Jan. 1. The increase of weight limit from four to eleven pounds, will increase the work of the postoffice. Only regular post parcel stamps are to be used.

The following features of parcels post regulations are noted:

Distinctive parcel post stamps must be used on all fourth class matter beginning Jan. 1, 1913 and such matter bearing ordinary postage stamps will be treated as "Held for Postage." Parcels will be mailed at post offices, branch post offices, lettered and local-named stations and such numbered stations as may be designated by the postmaster. All parcels must bear the return card of the sender; otherwise they will not be accepted for mailing.

FOOTBALL SEASON OVER

Locals Show Much Improvement in Their Last Game

HILLSBORO TAKES ITS REVENGE

Defeats Estacada at Hillsboro 13 to 0—Inexperience of Locals Causes About 90 Yards in Penalties.

Hillsboro at home, with its plunging full-back, Lytle, working like a clock, evened up with Estacada High at football, last Saturday, 13 to 0. Inexperience, together with a dry field, contributed to the Estacadians downfall, but it was a fiercely fought battle just the same and the score should have been 6 to 0, the last touchdown coming on a foul, which the umpire would not allow because he didn't see it.

A head-on collision in the first scrimmage loosened Larson's teeth when he rammed his mouth into Bartlett's forehead. It raised a bump on Ken's marble browlet as big as a goose egg and caused the claret to flow in streams. Eventually the bump put Larson out of the game, but Bartlett played a grand game clear to the finish, he and Keith dividing honors in ripping through the line and tackling. These two, however, in their eagerness, played offside frequently. Harriman held Olsen the big tackle even, but despite this, substantial gains were made in the first period. The ball was worked down to striking distance of Estacada's goal and a penalty for offside play, put the ball within a yard of the goal. Then Lytle the star man was called on to put it over. He failed the first time, but succeeded the second. Thompson missed goal.

The second touchdown came in the second half, when Lytle took a forward pass and dodging through a scattered field, broke through for a 40 yard run. Fellows was fouled when he tackled and Lytle flew on, only Dale between him and the goal. Dale missed and Lytle chalked up another 6 points, Thompson kicking goal. After that Hillsboro fought for time, the game closing with the ball on her 10 yard line. For Estacada, Morton played a great game his fierce tackling, punting and end runs scaring the enemy. Womer was strong tackling. The forward pass didn't work, every attempt failing except a gain of 20 yards to Dale. The enemy laid for the ends realizing they were beaten if the forward pass got away.

Estacada was frequently penalized for offside play, losing about 80 yards, while Hillsboro lost about 20. Twice the ball was on Hillsboro's 10 yard line but the enemy held and the ball was lost. This closed the football season for Estacada, which has made a good record, considering her inexperience. Coach Ford is mightily pleased with the boys and predicts a great team next year.
