### NEW INDUSTRY IS PLANNED.

Juice of Loganberry May Rival Fan ous Grape Juice.

Portland-Possibilities of the development of an important new industry in Oregon, in the extraction and pre servation for the market of loganberry juice were discussed at the annua meeting of the State horticultural so-

Professor Lewis, of the Oregon Agricultural college, has been experi menting upon loganberry juice as a market commodity for some time, and especially during the past year he has made careful investigations and experiments in the matter. He said that he believed that loganberry juice will prove superior to grape juice when it is placed on the market in commercial quantities, and that such an industry may soon become a large factor in the agricultural prosperity

He said that 1000 acres would be required to support a factory for the manufacture of loganberry juice in paving quantities for the market, and expects soon to see several such factories established in the loganberry districts.
