To Progress' Subscribers.

By the first of the year, the present editor of The Progress will have been in charge of the paper eleven months. Between now and Feb. 1, notices to those who haven't paid for the year passing, will be mailed and those who fail to pay by Feb. 1, will be stricken from the subscription list. And for this reason:

It may not be known to the subscribers, but there is a government ruling which forbids any publisher from sending a weekly paper to a delinquent subscriber longer than one year at the second class mailing rate. The Progress, accordingly, cannot take a chance on losing the mailing privilege.

During the present year the editor has striven to whip the subscription list into shape and the roll call now is composed of live folks, people who say they like the paper and will stay by it. The list has been nearly doubled and due appreciation is hereby acknowledged.

Besides, one "dun" a year isn't much is it, when you take into consideration that practically every other line of business expects its money at the expiration of 30 to 60 days? So be ready when The Progress sends its notice to delinquents.

No Snakes to Bother

In Brazilian Jungles.

"Speaking of snakes," said A. Powell of Port Valcjo, Brazil, who is visiting his sister Mrs. J. R. McCurdy, "Brazilian jungles haven't as many as you will see in the bayous of Louisiana or Alabama. Around the railroad camps where I have been the past year, a snake was a positive curiosity. This railroad which is built by American capital is 220 miles long and 1,500 in the interior—right in the jungles."

Mr. Powell is employed in the offices of the engineers. The road taps the big forests heretofore little utilized for rubber, because of the stretch of waterfalls in the Maderia river, a branch of the Amazon. His company also buys and exports rubber. The stiff costs about \$2.50 a pound and the greaser government adds on a good hunk as export duty, so it is little wonder, although the rubber is quite plentiful that it is high when it reaches the U. S.

The climate is hot at Port Valcjo and there is much fever and other tropical disease, but Americans are temperate, boil the water and take care of themselves. The pay is good and all employes of the company are allowed a vacation on full pay and expenses to their homes in America, every year. Mr. Powell will shortly leave for New York from whence he will sail for Brazil. The trip to the interior is made by steamer on the Amazon and Maderia.

Teachers boost raise

At the recent meeting of teachers during institute last week, resolutions were passed asking that Superintendent Gary's salary be raised to not less than \$1,600 a year. At present it is \$1,200. The legislature will act on this.

The teachers also declare in favor of closing the schools on only the following days: Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Years, Memorial day and Fourth of July.

The teachers resolved in favor of using school houses as social centers. They would like to see agriculture, domestic science and shop work taught in all high schools.

More than 200 teachers of Clackamas county attended the institute including those of Estacada.

It was announced during the meeting that Margaret Curran of Washington is to succeed Miss Hewitt formerly of Estacada, who is now supervisor in the First District. Miss Hewitt, it was stated, is to return to her home in Michigan.

Mrs. Emma Lichtborn brought suit in the circuit court at Portland for \$25,000 against W. W. McCredie, baseball magnate, alleging injuries to Albert Lichtborn of three broken ribs and the collarbone. One of the ribs penetrated a lung.

E. B. Tongue district attorney and well known in Estacada, has been sued for \$25,000 at Hillsboro by a contractor who alleges that Tongue, during the campaign, declared he was hooked up with the paving trust and drawing money from it as well as from the city.
