**ASK LEGISLATURE FOR HELP**

Ranchers want all Clackamas county precincts to join petition for allowing cattle to run.  
Starting among ranchmen and farmers of the less thickly populated part of Clackamas county, who are hard hit by the recent law forbidding the running at large of stock, petitions are to be circulated in every precinct in the county, asking the legislature to assist in the revocation of the law, thus permitting horses and cattle to pasture outside fences. Hogs are to be kept penned.

The petitions are to be placed in the hands of Representatives F. M. Gill or Chris Schuebel, providing the latter is recovered from an attack of typhoid by the time the legislature meets.  
The new law works a tremendous hardship on ranchers in the less thickly populated part of the county. Pasturage is confined to the ranches and stock cannot roam the free ranges. Beef is likely to go up in price and many farmers may have to sell their stock because of lack of hay.

The law passed by 919 majority, most of which came from Oregon City and the old settled part of the county. Besides, many voted for keeping stock up because the measure was so worded that it misled the voters. Just what can be done by the legislature except to refer a new law to the people two years hence, is not known. But it is possible the law may be knocked out on irregularity and because of its misleading title. E. Lacy of Springwater is one of those urging every person interested to circulate and sign petitions right away so that the legislature may have the matter before it soon after it convenes.
