Against Election of Mrs. Miller,
Raps his Former Associates.

Alderman W. Algernon Jones is declaring headedly that he is no longer a member of the Estacada City Council because of the election of a woman as a member.

Alderman Jones is an unreconstructed anti-suffragette. Before election he was "agin" women voting and when the ballots showed that suffrage had come and alas, for keeps, W. Algernon waxed exceeding wroth and swore, that he wished the Great Horn Spoon, that he wished he lived in Dahomey or Senanegabia or some place where only males vote. But he swallowed his chagrin and grimly faced the future, prepared to endure what couldn't be cured. He had an idea that the men would hold the offices anyhow.

After the council had elected Mrs. Miller, Alderman Jones again stated he had resigned. And, since then, he has said so again and again. And he says he means it.
