Looney Buys Estate of Claussen for \$25,000

Ballard Looney, who sold his ranch in Garfield, last spring and went to West Virginia, his old home, expecting to remain there, has concluded to stay by Oregon, for the last week he bid in the Peter Claussen ranch of 120 acres in George. The property is partly cleared and the balance is easily cleared. The buildings are not of much value, but the land is choice. Another item of interest is that it is supposed about \$5,000 in gold is buried somewhere on this ranch. Claussen during the panic became frightened and withdrew his money from a Portland bank. So far as known he never re-deposited it and he did not spend it.

VOTE FOR GOOD ROADS

Taxpayers of Various Districts Hold Meetings

TAX RUNS FROM 5 TO 10 MILLS

Estacada to Hold Meeting Saturday to Raise Money for a New Road to Bridge—New Supervisors in Three Districts

Meetings held, thus far, in Eastern Clackamas, show that the taxpayers are for good roads. They have voted from 5 to 10 mills in each district. There are two meetings to be held, one in Estacada and the other at Eagle Creek. Both are next Saturday. The Estacada meeting is for the purpose of raising money to build a new road across the northeast corner of the park to connect with the Springwater road which is to be macadamized to the top of the hill. The road has been surveyed and easement across the P. R. L. & P. property will be issued immediately it is promised. Local people feel that good roads from the country are necessary to the town's prosperity and it is expected a sufficient sum will be raised to make the new road to the bridge. The Estacada meeting is at the city hall at 1 P. M.

At the meetings so far held supervisors and tax are as follows: A. N. Jensen, No. 9, 10 mills; G. T. Hunt, No. 49, 10 mills; Chas. Duncan, No. 10, 5 mills; J. A. Reid, No. 33, 6 mills.

Duncan in District 10

At the Tracy school house Saturday 30 voters turned out and after considerable discussion, 5

mills tax was voted. Many wanted 8 mills, but they were outvoted. This will raise about \$1,800 which with the \$800 left from last year and the general tax of \$1,100 gives \$3,700. About \$500 is apportioned to the Reagan road, \$300 to the road from Zion to Bannockburn and \$250 to the Thomas road. Charles Duncan was elected supervisor.

Votes 10 mill Road Tax

Residents of Road District 49, of which G. T. Hunt is supervisor, at a meeting held Saturday at Garfield Country club house, voted a 10 mills tax for the coming year. There were 40 voters present and all were for good roads and a tax. The vote was 25 to 5 for 10 mills, the five dissenters desiring a slightly smaller tax.

After the meeting the voters and their wives and families enjoyed a luncheon and dancing to music furnished by the club orchestra.

10 Mills at George

At the road meeting held in George recently a 10 mills tax was voted and A. N. Jensen was elected road supervisor. Twenty three voters were present. Plans were talked for securing powder to blast out the stumps on the new road to Estacada, preparing it for grading later.

Elect Reid, Supervisor

Voters of the Springwater road district, No. 33, at a special meeting Saturday, voted a tax of 6 mills for the roads the coming year and elected J. A. Reid, road supervisor. There was a good attendance of voters. Roads in the Springwater section are in pretty good condition and there was a sentiment of levy-

ing a less tax for the coming year. Heretofore it has been about 10 mills on an average.

Charles Dubois suggested a supervising committee to cooperate with the supervisor and the idea was adopted enthusiastically by the election of S. E. Wooster, Earl Kilgore and J. E. Schenk. It was decided to use the money for macadamizing the Springwater hill from the bridge over the Clackamas up.

Parcels Post Jan. 1;

Some of the Rules.

January 1 the Parcels post law will be in effect. Packages up to 11 pounds may be shipped at a cost of from 5 to 12 cents a pound, depending upon distance. At the latter rate shipments abroad may be made.

Ordinary stamps will be invalid for parcels post, a distinctive stamp having been issued and in the hands of postmasters or those delegated by him to have charge of them. A parcel up to 3 feet long and 3 feet thick will be acceptable. They must be securely wrapped and bear the return card of the sender otherwise they will not be accepted for mailing.

Farm and factory products will be acceptable for mailing under certain regulations. Already fresh eggs have been shipped by mail safely.

Later on Postmaster Johnson will have a supply of literature bearing on the subject, so that all patrons may have a good understanding of the new rules.
