HELP FOR STOCKMEN

Gill Would Repeal County Law Voting to Pen Stock

TO LET PRECINCTS DECIDE

Will also Work to Have People of Road Districts have Full Charge of Road Money—Sign the Petitions.

Representative F. M. Gill has prepared a bill and will introduce it at the coming session of the legislature, repealing the law empowering a county vote on stock running at large. His bill will provide that the matter be left to the precincts to decide at a special or general election. He thinks, in this way, no injustice will be done.

"I believe," he added, discussing the matter, "that the vote last election on this question is void, as the law was not followed in putting it on the ballot and the result has not been published 60 days in a newspaper as provided by law."

As to Road Districts
"At the request of Garfield Grange, petitions asking the Clackamas county delegation in the legislature to work for a bill to organize a road district the same as a school district is now organized, giving the people of the road district full charge of tax money paid in the district will be left at the Estacada Mercantile Co., and at Dales' for signatures of legal voters. ESTACADA VOTES TAX

Voters Decide upon 10 Mills For Good Roads

COMMITTEE WITH THE COUNCIL

Three Business Men to Confer on How \$1,000 Shall be Spent—Vote For Tax is 18 to 6 For it

A fairly well attended meeting of taxpayers at the City hall Saturday afternoon, a road tax of 10 mills was voted and a decision reached to fix up the roads entering the city.

The work is to be done under the supervision of the city council with an advisory committee composed of W. F. Cary, C. E. Dubois and Edwin Bates, who are to determine where the fund of \$1,500 to be raised may be best applied for road improvement. The meeting decided to grade and gravel the road to the Springwater bridge and after that the other roads needing repairs will be attended to. The vote on the tax was 18 to 6. J. S. McCurdy was chairman of the meeting and E. S. Womer, secretary. Charles Dubois proposed the advisory committee.

Hourly Railroad Service

Sunday is Discontinued

Beginning Jan. 1, the hourly service on Sundays, heretofore, in operation on the P. L. & P. line to Estacada is discontinued until further notice. This follows as a result of a policy of retrenchment ordered on the system, which includes also the laying off of the assistant depot agents for three months.

F. D. Hunt, traffic manager, J. R. Reinke, superintendent of bridge and buildings and J. W. Hewitt, superintendent of transportation on the O. W. P. lines were here last Thursday inspecting the company property at Estacada and at Cazadero. The stone crusher has been closed for the winter. While here the officials conferred with Mayor Reed regarding the proposed new road through the park to the bridge and talked over cleaning the streets and the company right of way.
