F. M. Gill and wife will leave this week for Dufer, Oregon, where Mr. Gill will engage in farming on a large scale. Mr. Gill served this county as one of its representatives in the state legislature the past two years and was instrumental in securing the passage on a number of laws of a progressive nature.

Fruit districts of the state might take a tip from Hood River bee keepers, who have asked that orchardists do not spray their trees during the time the blossoms are fully open. This results in killing large numbers of bees, which are the most valuable helpers the orchardists have. Their aid is invaluable in spreading pollen from tree to tree.

Word has already been sent out from the headquarters of the Oregon Development League urging that all sections of the state start early to arrange for exhibits at the Eastern land shows next fall. It is pointed out it is not too soon to start the work of judicious planting of crops, with exhibits in mind, so that the best products may be sent away in small quantities for this purpose.

A recent example of the effectiveness of this work has just come to light. Having become interested in the Clackamas County exhibit at the Minneapolis Land Show, six families of Minneapolis sent a man to Clackamas County to pick out suitable locations where they might settle. Actual demonstration of crops grown on Western lands is the best possible argument for immigration.

### Died

William L. Crane and old resident of Springwater died at the St. Vincent hospital at Portland Sunday morning of cancer of the bladder. The deceased was taken sick about a year ago and a month ago was taken to the hospital and submitted to an operation but the dread disease was too deeply rooted and three weeks later the sufferer succumbed to its ravages. Deceased was 52 years of age and unmarried. He is survived by two brothers, George and Delos Crane both of Springwater. Undertaker Henthorn went to Portland Monday and brought the remains to the undertaking parlors here and prepared it for burial. Funeral was held Tuesday and the remains interred in the Springwater Cemetery.

### TO RECALL COUNTY OFFICIALS

According to word received from Oregon City, a stormy session was held at that city last Saturday by a number of tax payers of the county and a recall has been started against Judge Beaty and commissioners Mattoon and Blair. The charges are mishandling of county money. The committee appointed at a mass meeting held at the county seat a few weeks ago has been collecting evidence and brought in a report charging that the County Board had been careless with the handling of county affairs, had conducted the county business in a mysterious secret manner and had given out privileges to corporations without the taxpayers being aware of the fact. The report was accepted as correct and the following resolutions adopted.

"Whereas, the report of our committee shows that our present county government has handled the affairs of Clackamas county, Oregon, in a careless, extravagant and unbusiness like manner."

"Therefore, be it resolved that we, legal voters and taxpayers of Clackamas county, condemn the actions of the county court, and that we take legal steps to remedy same and proceed at once with our recall."

The resolution carried a vote of thanks for those who had supported the fight and also for the investigating committee.
