Fourth Class Postmaster Examination, Saturday, June 23, 1913

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on the date named above an examination will be held at Boring, Ore., as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster of class (A) at Cazadero and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$250.00 for the last fiscal year. Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age

for all purposes at 18 years, women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted. Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced. The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Cazadero or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission Washington, D. C. Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington at least 7 days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.
