### DUBOIS VS. HUNT

In Justice Given's court Tuesday a fierce legal battle raged continuously from one o'clock in the afternoon until six thirty the same evening. About everyone in town including the writer was there and stayed the session through from soup to desert. The suit was brought by Dubois against Ed Hunt to collect balance due on a bill of lumber sold the defendant last spring. Hunt did not deny the purchasing of the lumber but contended there was more material delivered by Dubois than was necessary to erect the building. There was a difference of opinion between the two to the amount of \$40. The attorneys for the defendant Messrs Heylman and Belknap by expert witnesses attempted to prove that the lumber delivered by the plaintiff was of an inferior quality than it should have been at the prices charged for it. This testimony had but little bearing in the case as prices and grades quoted were of the Pacific Coast Association. The majority of the evidence offered by the defence was stricken out. When the trial had progressed a couple of hours the court ordered the jury to be placed in charge of an officer and taken on a tour of inspection to the building in which the lumber was used. E. D. Allen was placed on the stand and gave expert testimony as to what constituted first, second and third grade lumber. Mr. Allen's testimony was given from an unprejudiced view and he was an unbiased and excellent witness. While there was but a small portion of the time consumed by the taking of evidence the attorneys burned up several hours in arguing on rulings of the court. Attorneys Bartlett and Devore represented Mr. Dubois' interests and handled the case in a way that was a credit to the profession, refraining from the use of language or tactics that would lower the dignity of the court. The final arguments were made and the case given to the patient jury who after about half an hour's deliberation returned a verdict for Mr. Dubois for the amount asked for less interest.
