In response to inquiries the department of entomology of the Oregon Agricultural College advises the use of arsenate of lead, at a strength of two pounds of the paste to fifty gallon of water for all leaf-eating insects, whether in the larval stage or some other. Growers are directed to spray both the upper and lower surfaces of leaves, being careful to keep the solution stirred and evenly mixed.

FIRE WARDENS FOR THIS SEASON

Mr. J. W. Ferguson Jr. of Estacada has been appointed by the State Forester as Supervising Warden for Clackamas County. He will have charge of all State, County and private patrol work in this County, and co-operate with Forest Supervisors of the National Forests to the greatest possible extent.

It is hoped that residents of the County will give him their hearty support and consult him in regard to burning permits, etc., of a local nature. He will be in touch with all local wardens and will gladly refer requests for information to the warden nearest you for any information or assistance he may be able to give.

It will be impossible for the State Forester to personally inspect all the work done by the numerous Supervising wardens in his employ, and their success will depend very largely upon the support they receive from the people whom the Forestry Law is intended to aid and protect.

Road supervisors in Clackamas County outside of the heavily timbered areas have been appointed fire wardens by State Forester Elliott for the convenience of ranchers. Those living west of Eagle Creek may obtain burning permits from the supervisors of their District.

J. W. Marrs of Dodge has been appointed State Warden for the Springwater and Dodge district.

Harry Reid of Garfield will be in charge of the district between firewood and the Clackamas east of Estacada.

Persons wishing burning permits should apply to the warden in their district or if not certain as to the warden in their locality should apply to J. W. Ferguson at Estacada.

It will be greatly appreciated if ranchers will report any violation of the Fire laws or any fires which they may discover to Mr. Ferguson or the warden in whose district they reside.

The following simple and effective way of bottling berry juices was employed by Professor C. I. Lewis in the laboratory of the Oregon Agricultural College, and is a sure way of saving loganberries at a good profit on the rainy day: Heat the berries to as nearly the boiling point as possible and strain out the juice. Mix juice with one third its measure of sugar, heat as before, pour into sterilized soft drink bottles, shove the cork about two inches within the neck of the bottle, and pour melted paraffine to the top. This process preserves the flavors and aromas and keeps the product indefinitely. Diluted with four times its measurement of water it is a delicious drink.
