Another one of these affairs masquerading under the guise of a picnic took place in the P. R. L. & P. Co.'s park last Sunday. This time it was called the Meat Cutters and Butchers of Portland picnic and once again in the case of the Firemen's picnic the organization under which it was given was not entirely responsible for the undesirable, who can always be found wherever as large a crowd of people are congregated as were here Sunday, and just as long as the western portion of the park remains a jungle and the railroad company continues to furnish the grounds for picnics without contributing to the expense of sufficient police to patrol the grounds, can the people of this city expect just such gangs as were here Sunday.

The P. R. L. & P. rents or furnishes the park to those who wish to hold a picnic and they in turn sell the stand concessions and rights to run games. The city authorities tell the gangsters that the ordinance prohibits the running of any game of chance; that the people, who play their games, must get value received for their money, and whenever an officer is near, the games are run according to the city law, but unless the city goes to the expense of stationing an officer at every one of the games, they are run crooked. What are you going to do about it? Is the city of Estacada going to go to the expense of employing twenty or more policemen to keep order in the city's park and receive no revenue with which to pay this extra expense? It's up to Estacada to do something. The recall of some of our county officials is not the only issue of the day.

There are some people here who are inclined to censure those who have sent reports of some of these doings to the Portland papers, and wish to hush the thing up. This would be all right to do if this had been the only offence, for being advertised to the country at large in this way, will only injure the town and adjoining country.

Whoever is receiving the revenues from the result of these picnics, should be compelled to employ sufficient police to keep order, and see that the numerous games being run are complying with the city laws.

### PROPOSED POSTAL LAWS

Unless the express companies succeed in defeating the plans of the postal authorities, a new law will go into effect August 15th in which the limit on the weight of parcel post packages will be lifted from eleven pounds and increased to twenty. In addition to increasing the limit on parcel post packages the second zone will be abolished. The first and second zones being consolidated and the rates applying to the first zone will prevail. Postmaster Johnson has not up to the present received any official notification of the changes, but in all probability will, before the date set for the laws to be effective providing the express companies do not succeed in their attempt to dictate to the government. There is also a possibility that in the near future the rates on all zones will be reduced slightly, or a flat rate may be established which will be the same per pound for any distance. The rates on packages over 11 pounds will be in proportion to the rates on smaller packages. That is an increase of 3 cents per additional pounds.
