Deputy District Attorney McGuire, in opposing a parole, urged that the evidence upon which LaFrance was convicted showed that he had deliberately planned and executed the plot which resulted in his defrauding three life insurance organizations for a total of \$15,000 and that he didn't believe conditions justified a parole. No leniency was shown by Judge Kavanaugh.
