### A GOOD EGG RECORD

A pen of 6 hens owned by Mr. Guthrie have laid 1349 eggs in the year ending Oct. 28th. This is an average of 224 5/6 eggs each. This pen record is better by ten eggs than the best at the great Egg Laying Contest at Stores, Conn., where 100 pens of 23 breeds participated. It is better than the Corvallis pen record of last year by at least 3 eggs.

The hens are of the first White Leghorn—White Rock cross. They have been kept in a pen 3x6ft., except for about one hour each day. This proves that with a little thought and care any family in town may profitably raise eggs for their table. At 30 cents per dozen the eggs from these 6 hens would bring \$33.85 or \$5.64 each.

Extract from a letter written to the Oregon City Enterprise by the Honorable F. M. Gill: "The delegates received a petition signed by 825 of the heaviest taxpayers of Clackamas county asking that the school superintendent's salary be increased from \$1000 to \$1600 per annum. The Educational Board of Clackamas county agreed with the delegates that if this increase was made they would dispense with the services of one of the school supervisors."
