to make corn one of their crops  
next year will be furnished free  
seed by the O. W. R. & N. Co. on

last fall many inquiries regarding  
seed have been received, and, as far  
as it will reach, the corn exhibited  
will be distributed among interested  
farmers. The company is also planning  
to organize boys' corn clubs  
throughout its territory and will  
offer prizes to the lads raising the  
best field corn in the largest quantities  
per acre. The company will  
require each farmer receiving free  
seed to agree to dispose of none of  
his crop except for seed and if he  
has more than enough for his own  
and his neighbors' use, the company  
will buy it from him at 10 per cent.  
above current market prices.

### The Early History of the Currinsville Church

Estacada, Or., Jan. 19, 1914.

Editor Progress:

I understand that there is a movement  
on foot to build a new church at  
Currinsville and I thought possibly it  
might be of interest to the rising generation  
to know the early history of the old church.  
In 1865 Philip Linn and family came  
across the plains from Illinois and  
bought the Knight place, north of  
Currinsville. This place included the Taylor  
farm, G. B. Linn farm and Robert  
Currin farm. About that time the  
conference of the M. E. Church, South, had  
sent a man by the name of McFarlan  
here to preach. Rev. McFarlan later  
became quite a noted preacher and a  
presiding elder. As they had no church  
building they held their services in  
Philip Linn's house until 1866 or 1867  
when they concluded to build a church.  
Philip Linn deeded two acres of land  
for a church and camp meeting ground  
where the church now stands. His  
three sons, Wm. T., John A. and B. F.,  
owned a saw mill on the Clackamas  
river just west of the Heiple farm and  
they sawed all the rough lumber used  
in its construction and the larger part  
of the labor was done by Mr. Linn  
and his sons and three sons-in-law. They  
aimed to set the church about the  
center of the two acres but when in  
after years it was surveyed they found  
it was to one side. They built a long  
open shed on the east end of the church  
where they had preaching in summer  
and at times when the church would  
not hold the congregation. The writer  
remembers attending church in this shed.  
Some of the heaviest contributors to  
the church outside of the Linn family  
were Wm. Howlett, who died recently,  
Uncle George Currin, father of Robert  
and Mrs. Hale, George Githens, father  
of Henry and John, and Mr. Cook,  
father of Al, of Damascus. No doubt  
but others gave but I do not know who  
they were. I do not think any of them  
gave over ten dollars, but please bear  
in mind that ten dollars then amounted  
far more than at the present time.  
In those days they usually had preaching  
once a month but in the winter the  
roads were so bad and the streams  
were too high to ford at times, so it  
was impossible for the preacher to fill  
his appointments. There were very  
few bridges then. Along about the  
time the church was started or before  
there was a camp meeting ground down  
where Alspaugh Station now is that was  
all heavy timber then, there were  
a number of log cabins built to accommodate  
the campers. Once while they were  
holding meeting there Bishop Kavanaugh  
preached, and when they dedicated  
the new church they called it  
Kavanaugh Chapel. The M. E. Church,  
South, held the church until six or  
seven years ago when the Northern  
Methodist took charge of it and has  
held it ever since. Just how this transfer  
was made I do not know. The old  
building has been practically rebuilt  
from time to time. It has had a new  
floor, new roof, rustic put on the outside,  
new windows put in and also been  
papered a number of times. In those  
early days it was nothing uncommon  
for the church to be filled to overflowing.  
People would go for miles to attend  
church and those who came a long  
distance were always invited to stay for  
"dinner" by those who lived near the  
church. There were no Sunday Schools  
or Epworth Leagues then and I might  
mention no ten cent theatres nor basket  
ball games to go to or telephones to  
visit over, but for all that the people  
seemed to be as happy and contented  
as they are at the present day.

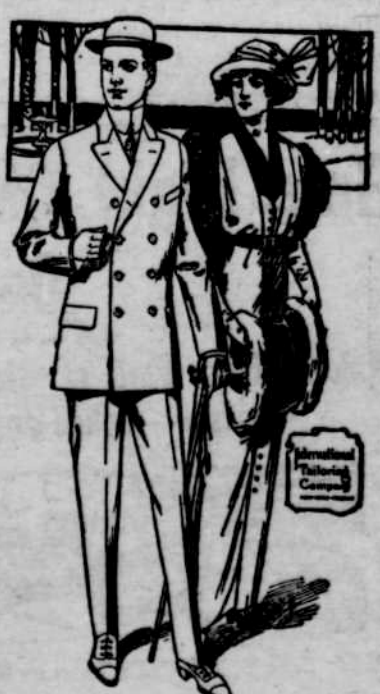
