BUILD ALASKA ROAD

1000 Miles Government Lines Provided for By Senate Bill.

Cost Not to Exceed \$40,000,000—Great Responsibility Placed on President Wilson.

Washington, D. C.—By a vote of 46 to 16, the senate passed the Alaska railway bill, directing the President to purchase or construct 1000 miles of railroad in Alaska at a cost of not to exceed \$40,000,000.

Fifteen Republicans and Senator Poindexter, Progressive, voted for the bill. Senators Bacon, Hoke Smith and Williams, Democrats, voted against it.

The bill places on the President responsibility for the selection of the route from tidewater to the interior of Alaska, and the construction, equipment and operation or leasing of such lines as he may construct or buy to constitute this route. The broadest powers are conferred on the President in carrying out his duties.

The bill provides for a redemption fund into which shall be paid 75 per cent of all moneys derived from the sale of public lands in Alaska or of the coal or mineral contents thereof.

Machinery utilized in the construction of the Panama canal is made available for the construction work.

Unavailing efforts to reduce the \$40,000,000 appropriation authorized for the work were made in the closing hours of the debate. Senator Hoke Smith sought to have the appropriation reduced to \$25,000,000, and Senator Smoot to \$35,000,000. Among other amendments defeated were the Norris amendment for government steamships to Alaska; the Poindexter amendment for the sale of Alaska coal at cost to Pacific Coast points, and the Cummins substitute, limiting the construction to one main line.

With the consent of the territories committee the bill was amended before passage to require the senate's approval of the appointment of civil engineers receiving more than \$3000 per annum; to forbid any payment for the good will of existing railways; giving injured employees the right to sue the government, and limiting the government's defense to the grounds provided for in the Federal employers' liability law of 1908.

A similar bill is pending in the house.

Huge Fortune Pledged to Aid Suffragist Cause

Washington, D. C.—The big fortune of Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, of New York, and her influence has been pledged to the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage, which is battling here to secure an amendment to the constitution giving the ballot to women.

The union received a letter from Mrs. Belmont applying for membership and enclosing a check for \$5000 as a contribution to the cause.

A statement was issued by the union declaring war on the Democratic party because the public rules committee has refused to create a woman suffrage committee in the house.

Suffrage leaders declared that they will make a special fight to defeat for congress Representative Henry, of Texas, chairman of the rules committee, because Mr. Henry, they say, dodged the issue by absenting himself.

Vacation Idea Denounced.

Washington, D. C.—Characterizing the practice of closing public schools during the summer months as "criminally and preposterous," and asserting that the most important problem of today was "to get city boys from three months' contamination in the city streets," P. P. Claxton, commissioner of the United States bureau of education, approved a plan which would mean continuous school sessions. He says that he proposes that two million children shall be enlisted in vocational work.

Woman Wins Own Suit.

Olympia, Wash.—Mrs. Clarissa Bailey, of Seattle, who during the last term of the Supreme court was allowed the unusual privilege of arguing her own case after she had disagreed with her attorney, was awarded a reduction of nearly \$17,000 in street assessments against her property, in a decision handed down Saturday. Mrs. Bailey, who is of Indian extraction, asked and was accorded the right to argue her own case after she had seen two women lawyers on opposite sides of a case the previous day.

Slide Is Blocking Street.

Seattle—A portion of "profanity hill," between the King County court house and the Seattle city hall, softened by recent rains, shifted to such an extent late Thursday that Fifth avenue, on the east side of the city hall, was blocked to traffic between the race place and Yesler way. To protect the police assembly room and the municipal court rooms, the windows of the ground floor were boarded up with three-inch planks. The landslide, which has been causing trouble for many years, slid 15 feet.

Wolves Devour Child.

Paris—The long continued cold, especially in the central districts of France, is bringing numbers of wolves, frantic with hunger, out of the woods. A little girl at La Couquille, near Perigueux, was devoured by the animals, the searching party finding only a torn pinafore and a few bones. Hunting parties are being organized everywhere.

Pardons Voice Defiance.

Columbia, S. C.—Governor Blease Monday replied to the legislature's proposal to strip him of the power of executive clemency by commuting the sentences of 14 convicts in the state penitentiary, including four murderers. This brings the governor's commutations for January up to 40.

CRISIS APPROACHES

Mexican Leaders Talk With Lind on Future of Nation.

Choice of Huerta's Successor Proposed to Be Subject—Rebels Control Large Oil Supply.

Washington, D. C.—Conviction in administration circles that the Huerta regime in Mexico is rapidly approaching a collapse has led to much discussion here of the nature of John Lind's frequent conferences with Mexican leaders. Belief is expressed that President Wilson's representative is surveying the situation to determine how events will shape themselves when the Huerta structure falls.

Mr. Lind's latest conference with Jesus Flores Magon and other Mexican statesmen have interested members of the diplomatic corps, who pointed out that in view of President Wilson's reiterated statements that he would not recognize Huerta nor any of the things for which he stands, the American envoy might naturally be induced to throw out hints as to what type of man would meet with approval of the White House.

So far as officials here are advised, the vicissitudes which preceded the Madero revolt and followed the downfall of that leader's stormy incumbency of the presidency have not detracted from the high standing which Francisco de la Barra, at present minister to France, attained as the man of the hour when General Diaz was forced to abdicate.

Senator de la Barra was brought forward as the leader who, as provisional president, would placate factions pending a new election. Some of the diplomats believe that de la Barra could again compose the situation in Mexico so as to permit of the choice of a successor. They regard him as the man under whose leadership all factions would be most likely to shift their activities from the battlefield to the ballot box.

Some uneasiness was occasioned at the War department by the appearance of smallpox among the Federal soldiers and refugees near El Paso, Texas, and instructions went forward to Brigadier General Elias to proceed at once with the vaccination of all Federal soldiers, as well as the women and children who crossed over into Texas after fall of Ojinaga.

The general condition of financial affairs in Mexico was summarized in this statement from the State department:

"Americans are finding the forced loans levied upon them a great burden."

The Ebano oil district in San Luis Potosi is reported to be fully controlled by the Mexican federal government, so that oils are furnished to the railroad with little interruption.

Chemical Company Is Buying Radium Lands

Washington, D. C.—Hearings before the house mines committee on bills proposing the withdrawal of radium-bearing public lands continue. Joseph Finney, of the Standard Chemical company, admitted that his company recently closed a deal for five additional land claims in Colorado. He denied, however, that his agents were under orders to buy all the radium claims they could "lay their hands on," and said his company now had all the claims it needed.

Charges that Dr. Howard Kelly, of Baltimore, had inspired the effort to withdraw radium lands "to divert attention from himself" were made by O. Barlow Willmarth, head of two radium mining companies of Colorado. Fears of monopolization of radium ores, Willmarth said, were groundless.

Thomas Curran, who said his family owned and operated 70 claims in Colorado, told the committee that doubt as to Dr. Kelly's humane motives was not possible.

Va., was expelled by the convention of United Mineworkers of America. M. D. Whitesell, the delegate accredited to the union, was not present when the action was taken. The attack on the union was started by an international board member, who asserted that it was dangerous for a union miner to appear near Poochontas.

San Francisco—Mrs. Margaret H. Elliott, sister of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, is seriously ill in her home at Berkeley. Mrs. Elliott is the wife of Professor E. H. Elliott, ex-dean of Princeton and now lecturer on international law and jurisprudence at the University of California. She is the sister of Professor Stockton Axon, of Princeton, an associate of President Wilson before he became governor of New Jersey.

Lifting Record Smashed.

Omaha—The world's amateur weight-lifting record was broken here by Arthur Rouser, an Omaha high school boy, at a meet held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. He lifted a 230-pound dumbbell above his shoulders. The former record was 215 1/2 pounds.
