Why don't you register?
We never took any stock in this ground hog weather theory no how.

The plan to form a new county out the east parts of Multnomah and Clackamas counties will meet with a right hearty hurrah in Estacada.

Estacada could but undoubtedly will not hold a voting contest to determine our most popular citizen and then run him for governor of the great state of Oregon.

The supreme court handed down a decision favoring the drys in every particular in the local option vote last fall, which makes a complete victory in every town where a local option vote was taken.

Influence is being brought to bear on Governor West to have him become a candidate for Congress against Hawley. As West would be a strong candidate and with a Bull Moose in the field, it would make a lively congressional scrap.

Not to be misleading in the statement made last week in regard to the income tax, the Progress stands corrected on the amount required to have that pleasure. An income of \$4000 is subject to taxes for a married man and \$3000 for a single man.

If Oregon small fruit was placed on sale in the middle west states in the form of jam, jelly and preserves, it would find a ready market and be a welcome substitute for the adulterated and inferior articles the people of that section are forced to eat.

Over around Oregon City several republicans and democrats are making a noise like candidates for county office. For this end of the county they appear to have no interest and do not seem to care whether our voters know they are candidates or not. No doubt they figure that we will have to vote for them anyhow. Alas! 'Tis only too true. We must continue to vote for candidates who after their election and installation, give the east end the worst of it at every opportunity.

Out of over two hundred names registered by C. W. Devore, only ten were women. As a general rule, women are for temperance and state wide prohibition, but unless women register before the first of May they will have no chance to vote at the primaries, and thus help to nominate men for office who are for prohibition. If you want to see Oregon go dry this fall, register so that you may have an opportunity to vote on this question for if left to the men alone, prohibition may be defeated.

NEW COUNTY PROPOSED
Down in Portland there is a certain element that is endeavoring to bring the matter about, with the paramount idea of simply embracing the present limits of Portland in the limits of Multnomah county and thus leaving all the rest of the county to be formed into a new county with Gresham as the county seat or be annexed to Clackamas county. Either way would be satisfactory to the consolidation boosters of Portland, but it will probably not be acceptable to the people residing east of Mount Taber, all whom will be entitled to have their say.

The Outlook's Portland correspondent notes that L. M. Lepper does not think favorably of the consolidation or division plan, and there is reason to believe that the people of the county will never consent to any plan that takes Gresham out of Multnomah county. There would be small objection to a plan that would include the country east of Portland as far as Troutdale and Powell valley with the boundaries of Portland, leaving the remainder of the county to be consolidated with the eastern part of Clackamas in a new county with Estacada or Sandy as the county seat—Gresham Outlook.

TINY MEN AND WOMEN.
Some Noted Lilliputians Who Were Exhibited in England.

Of dwarfs exhibited in England the most celebrated was the Pole, Borulwaski, who was born in 1730 and died in 1807. At six he measured seventeen inches and finally, in his thirtieth year, reached thirty-nine inches. He had a sister shorter than himself by head and shoulders. Borulwaski traveled all over Europe, and now lies buried at Eburan.

In the year of his death his successor, Charles Stratton, known to fame as "General Tom Thumb," was born. When twenty-five he was thirty-nine inches high.
In 1844 he appeared in England and had an extraordinary success. After extensive travel in both hemispheres the "general" again visited England in 1857, but the dwarf man, in spite of many personal and intellectual qualities, was less attractive than the dwarf boy. In the year 1853 he married the very minute American Lavinia Warren, and died in 1882.

Other well known dwarfs of the past have been:
Three children of a Scottish shepherd named McKinley, the shortest of whom was forty-five inches.
Don Francisco Hidalgo, a Spaniard, twenty-nine inches.
Jan Hanuromo, a Dublinian, twenty-eight inches.
Mary Jane Youngman, an Australian, who at the age of fifteen was thirty-five inches high—Pall Mall Gazette.
