## The Payment of Taxes

Taxes must be paid before the 1st day of April; provided one half of the tax may be paid before the 1st day of April and the remaining half to be paid prior to the 1st day of September.

If taxes are not paid before the 1st day of April, a penalty of one per cent for each month is added.

In case one half of the tax is paid before the 1st day of April, a penalty of one per cent for each month is added and collected with the remaining half of such tax to be paid prior to September 1st.

All taxes remaining unpaid on the 1st day of September shall become delinquent.

This bank will receive and pay taxes for anyone without extra charge.

Taxes are now due and payable.
