BEST MEETING EVER HELD IN ESTACADA

The booster meeting held in Estacada last Saturday, was the most enthusiastic ever held in the town. While it is impossible to state exactly how many were present, it is safe to say that there were over two hundred. It was a representative gathering of citizens of Estacada, Springwater, Garfield, Currinsville, Eagle Creek, George, Dodge and Barton, determined to unite for the good of all and the betterment of the community.

E. W. Bartlett called the meeting to order and presided all day with the exception of one hour in the afternoon when J. A. Somer acted as chairman. Mr. Bartlett "blazed the way" in a very able extemporaneous speech in which he informed the convention that they could do considerable if they wished and did not doubt but what they would. He told of the disadvantages that the Commercial Club labored under because of its inability to employ a secretary on account of lack of funds, but declared that Estacada had one organization that was up-to-date and doing something. This reference to the Civic Improvement Club was liberally applauded. Referring to the Estacada Commercial Club, G. T. Hunt proposed that the citizens of the surrounding country join in with the Commercial Club, employ a secretary and "do things" for the entire community. This capital suggestion of Mr. Hunt's deserves attention and the Progress will speak of his plan in the near future.

Many addressed the convention regarding the building of a cannery and a rising vote demonstrated that it was favored by all. The Estacada Fruit Growers Association whose officers are enterprising Garfield citizens, have been planning for some time to establish some sort of an institution for the sale of fruit and it was made clear that there should be no competition between the two, but rather the convention would join in with the Fruit Growers association if desired, and if by so doing the best results could be obtained. A cannery owned by home people, is the most likely to be built, although the convention would not object to local or outside capital building it, if an agreement could be reached satisfactory to all. A committee consisting of G. T. Hunt, H. A. LeBarr, J. H. Harkender, Sherman Kigore and E. S. Womer was elected to gather data regarding the building and operation of a cannery, devise plans, receive suggestions and confer with the Commercial Club and Fruit Growers Association. This committee, composed of progressive and "go forward" men, will do the work well and report at a public meeting which will be held later on a date which will be announced in the Progress.

The cannery question settled, the convention took up the matter of roads and road building and many suggestions were advanced and debated. Opposition to the proposed issue of \$600,000 bonds for the purpose of building the so-called Pacific Public Highway, was very pronounced. It was the sense of the convention that the main traveled road to Portland should be improved and efforts will be made to bring it about. Regarding road matters in East Clackamas county, the convention took a decided stand and adopted the following resolutions, which speak for themselves:

Whereas, The roads leading through Eastern Clackamas county and running north from Springwater through Estacada, Currinsville, Eagle Creek and Barton and to Portland have been put in good condition by the people of the road districts through which they pass in Eastern Clackamas, and Whereas, The only impassable stretches of said road are the portions running over Damascus Hill and the road down the river from Barton to Baker's bridge, and Whereas, The road leading from Barton to Boring has about one mile of poor road leading over the hill between the two points as the road now is used,
