**SEVEN DIE IN FLOOD**

**Worst Storms Ever Known Sweep Southern California.**

**Damages Estimated at \$4,500,000—Los Angeles Suburbs Short of Food, Lights and Water.**

Los Angeles—With a loss of probably more than \$4,500,000 and a total of seven human lives in four days, Southern California began to recover Sunday from the effects of the worst storm in its history.

Swept by wind and rain for three days, most of the territory between the Tehachapi mountains and the Mexican line was flooded, but with the sun shining at intervals Sunday the situation improved considerably and, while nearly all of the towns affected remained isolated, progress was made toward re-establishing wire and rail communication.

According to an estimate made by A. C. Hansen, assistant city engineer, Los Angeles was damaged to the extent of at least \$1,500,000. One hundred and fifty thousand dollars represented the damage to city streets alone. The remainder represented losses sustained by railroads and by citizens who lost their homes, which were swept away by the floods, with all their household effects.

Except in the vicinity of Pomona, this county, where young groves suffered severely, orange growers reported comparatively little damage. Ranches and small farms were inundated, but no reliable data could be obtained as to the losses sustained by them.

The flood situation about Los Angeles became acute early Saturday night and continued to be aggravated at the same time by a gale which reached velocities of from 35 to 50 miles an hour at various points inland and along the Pacific ocean shore.

Poles and towers carrying power lines and the wires of telephone and telegraph companies went down and, with railroads and suburban trolley lines already out of commission, the situation became at once one of complete prostration. For nearly four hours there was no streetcar service, and during the entire day the city had only brief periods of communication with the East. Surrounding towns, with few exceptions, were almost entirely isolated, without communication by wire, railroad or trolley.

Railroads report that the collapse of big bridges over the Los Angeles river in this city and the washing out of big spans elsewhere made it uncertain when traffic could be resumed. But large gangs of men were sent out to work in continuous shifts in efforts to repair damage as quickly as possible.

More than 100 homes were destroyed in Los Angeles alone by the torrents that rushed through the Los Angeles river and the Arroyo Seco. As the floods in these waterways subsided household goods and other property including everything, from stoves to pianos and beds, were left stranded on sand bars.

After a steel bridge over the river buckled and broke, the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe railroads sent heavy cars loaded with scrap iron and heavy bulldozers plunging into the flood in efforts to divert further inroads by storm waters, which threatened railroad tracks skirting the river banks. The sweep of the floods was so strong at times, however, that these barriers were turned aside.

Besides numerous houses that tumbled off the caving banks, the river, usually a dry bed called a river by the Morro rocks in a storm and clogged with debris, swept away the Los Angeles pigeon farm. Extensive cotes tumbled into the stream before day light and thousands of pigeons were drowned.

**Cargo Fuel Saves Vessel.**  
Los Angeles—By feeding all the inflammable cargo and ship's fittings into the furnaces, Captain Paulse Sax saved the steamer Eureka from being dashed on the Morro rocks in a storm and docked safely in Port San Luis, according to the crew of the revenue cutter Manning, which arrived here after going to the Eureka's assistance. The regular fuel was exhausted and the vessel began to drift helplessly toward the rocks.

A cargo of box shoop and the ship's fittings went into the fire.

**City Stops Free Meals.**  
San Francisco—San Francisco closed its municipal dining room Sunday and hereafter no more free meals will be served the unemployed. The reason for the action was that the city's emergency appropriation of \$39,000 is exhausted. More than 2000 men lined up in a pouring rain for the final free breakfast, and a detail of police was on hand to prevent the pilfering of tableware. Many suspected of carrying away utensils were searched and a quantity of knives, forks and tin mugs was yielded.

**Japanese Submarine Gone.**  
Hiroshima, Japan—A Japanese submarine attached to the protected cruiser Hiraio was missing for three days. The naval attaches believe she has met with disaster and that all have been drowned. The submarine had been dispatched to search for torpedoes lost during practice off Kakumajima.

**William Accepts Throne.**  
Newied, Germany—Prince William, of Wied, entered the ranks of European sovereigns Monday when he formally accepted the throne of Albania, tendered to him by Essad Pasha, at the head of a deputation of Albanian notables.

**Storm in Spain Fierce.**  
Madrid—Fierce storms of wind and rain are raging the whole length of Spain. The telegraph lines are down in all directions and in some instances trains have found it impossible to make headway against the hurricane force of the wind.

**REBELS KILL BRITON**

**Three Other Foreigners Believed to Have Been Executed.**

**Alien Rancher, Incensed at Treatment by Rebels, Had Declared He Would Protest to Villa.**

El Paso—The execution, or murder, of William S. Benton, a British subject, by General Francisco Villa, head of the Mexican rebels, at Juarez, has become known here and caused intense excitement.

Two other British subjects, John Lawrence and a companion named Curtis, who went to look for Benton, are also missing.

Gustav Bauch, who was being tried for being a spy, also disappeared. Thomas D. Edwards, American consul at Juarez, said that when friends of Bauch went to visit him with bedding and food, he was not in the cell where he had been held incommunicado since last Sunday, while his trial was being held.

Reports were numerous that Bauch would be shot. The consul is confident that Bauch was not removed to Chihuahua, as he watched the train leave with General Villa on board.

Stewart quoted a rebel officer, whose name he did not recall, as remarking:

"Well, we've gotten rid of three more gringos."

Benton was one of the most prominent foreigners residing in Northern Mexico. Previous to adopting resolutions in mass meeting condemning the government for its handling of Mexican affairs, El Paso citizens selected ex-Governor Curry, of New Mexico, to call on Consul Edwards at Juarez for information concerning Benton's fate.

Mexico City—Gossip is current here that certain European powers again are planning to urge the United States to assume a more active policy in restoring peace in Mexico. Many persons expressed the belief that the Benton incident might be seized upon as an opportunity to impress such a view on the Washington government.

Various diplomats intimated that they would use the killing of Benton as the basis of protests to show their helplessness when it comes to protecting their nations in the greater part of Mexico.

**Disastrous Floods Sweep California Citrus Belt**

Los Angeles—Orange and lemon growers of the citrus fruit region about Los Angeles, who suffered severely in the freeze of January, 1913, sustained another hard blow in the storm which began early Wednesday and continued for three days. Groves that were nipped and shriveled by the frost a year ago were washed out by torrents that rushed down from the mountains and tore madly through the valleys. In many instances homes and other movable property floated off on the crest of the swirling currents with the trees.

Summarized, the flood situation about Los Angeles was as follows: Pomona, center of a large fruit-growing district—Orange and lemon groves razed by the storm waters. Every grove damaged more or less, each suffering loss of from \$500 to \$10,000. All railroad and electric lines washed out.

Covina, a town in the citrus belt—Menaced by floods held back only by a temporary dam hastily erected. Two drowned, Miss Susan Beville, a woman rancher, and her cousin, H. M. Seitz. Ranchers striving to save homes and groves.

Ontario, San Bernardino county—City water system damaged by storm. Many other towns reported similar conditions. The rains continue, with only slight abatement.

**Daniels Domestic "Angel."**  
Washington, D. C.—While Secretary Daniels is encouraging matrimony in the navy, he likewise took cognizance of the domestic hardships of naval officers who are away from home for a prolonged period.

The secretary sent a wireless to Rear Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz, asking him if he would like to have a visit with his family and when the admiral replied, Mrs. Fletcher and her two babies, with only a few hours' preparation, left on the Presidential yacht Mayflower, for Mexican waters.

**Ambassador Above Law.**  
New York—The appellate division of the Supreme court has declared that an American ambassador to a foreign power is above the law of his state at home and on this ground refused to compel James W. Gerard, ambassador to Germany, to return from his post and decide the appeal in a case which came before him when he was Justice of the Supreme court. The parties to the litigation declared that this case on appeal "must" be settled by the justice before whom it was tried, and an order to that effect was obtained.

**Frills Not for Farmer.**  
Washington, D. C.—The American farmer is not squandering his money on frills and furbelows, John T. Colter told the joint congressional rural credit committee. "The farmers of this country need a rural credit system," said Dr. Colter. "They will not run to extravagance if money is made cheaper for them. The American farmers borrow money, according to my investigation, for good and useful purposes."
