SECOND BOOSTER MEETING

Last Saturday was too nice a day to expect a crowded house at the second Booster Meeting. Many were loath to leave their work on the farm, but the lack in attendance was more than made up in enthusiasm.

E. W. Bartlett called the meeting to order and requested Guy T. Hunt to make a report for the committee. Mr. Hunt had spent several days in various parts of the state investigating canneries and gave a very complete report of what he had seen and heard. His facts and figures were very favorable to the success of a cannery.

Prof. C. I. Lewis of the Oregon Agricultural College delivered an address in which he strongly urged the building of a cannery in Estacada; said that now was the time to do it and he wanted to come back to Estacada in ten years and see a big cannery running. If the Cannery was here, prosperity would be apparent also. Prof. Lewis also discussed the kinds of fruit and vegetables that should be raised for canning.

A. P. Brown of Corvallis, a fruit grower and a prominent factor in the success of the cannery at Corvallis, next addressed the meeting and introduced the audience in the art of successful organization. He also gave an estimate of the cost of the machinery required. At the conclusion of his remarks, Prof. Lewis and himself answered many questions asked them.

By a unanimous vote of the convention the committee consisting of Guy T. Hunt, H. A. Labarr, J. H. Harkerider, Sherman Kilgore and E. S. Womer were instructed to go ahead and make all preliminary arrangements and plans. When this is accomplished, the canyas for funds will be commenced.

This committee will report in a short time to a third meeting, the date of which will be heralded in the Progress. This third meeting will be the most important of all and everybody should bear in mind and crowd Sparks' Family theatre to the doors. A favorable verdict and a liberal spirit spells in big letters PROSPERITY for town and community.

Hunt For Representative

Guy T. Hunt, a rancher of Garfield precinct, six miles from Estacada, has announced his candidacy for representative and will be a candidate before the republican primaries.

Mr. Hunt is a man whom the office sought. He refused to run at the request of friends, when petitions were circulated, signed by nearly every voter in his locality, he accepted and has filed his nomination.

Mr. Hunt is a hustler and stands ace high in his community. He is one of the men who started and put through the Garfield Country Club, a rural social proposition that is attracting state wide notice.

Mr. Hunt stands for fewer and better laws; declares there is being too much money spent in county and state for results obtained; that the code relating to roads and highways needs thorough revision, also that tax and labor laws need careful and thorough consideration.

Mr. Hunt is a thorough temperance man and lives in a dry precinct. There seems to be a general sentiment that that part of the county should have representation in the house, and Mr. Hunt stands a good chance for one of the three nominations.—Oregon City Courier.
