Chairman E. W. Bartlett informed the convention that Estacada business men could be depended upon to subscribe one-fourth of the stock. With this assurance as a starter a committee consisting of A. E. Sparks, J. A. Somer and R. W. Cary was appointed to select canvassers for each section in this community, who in turn will call upon their neighbors and solicit their financial support. Shares were placed at ten dollars each. These canvassers are all at work now and will be given a week or ten days to finish their tasks.
