Young Man Dies By Cwn Hand

This entire community was shocked beyond measure of expression, an Saturday last, upon receiving the news that Edward Robert Currin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. J. Currin, of Heppner, had ended his life. The news was received in town just at noon and was to the effect that Ed was dead but it did not transpire until some hours later just what the cause of death was.

He was at the headquarters ranch on Hinton creek where he had charge of the affairs of the big sheep and stock ranch in which he was interested along with his father. The act which ended his life was evidently committed about the middle of the forenoon as his lifeless body was found in the bunk house lying across the bed, when the call for dinner was made. He had shot himself through the heart, his hand still grasping the weapon, and his body was cold.

The news was immediately telephoned to the family in Heppner and they were hurried to the scene of the tragedy as fast as possible.

Dr. Allison and a number of friends of the family also went out to the ranch, and all indications pointing to a plain case of suicide, an inquest was not necessary. Some letters, also, were left beside the young man, these being addressed to members of the family. The letters gave some indication of the reasons why he killed himself and were to the effect that he was suffering greatly from ill health and had no hope of being better, and was under a great burden of worry.

To all those who were the best acquainted with Ed Currin, it was unbelievable that he would commit such an act. He was always of a happy disposition; he never complained, and any trouble or sickness he might be suffering was all buried deep within the confines of his own breast. The shock to his family is a terrible one and his many friends all over the county are grief stricken because of his untimely demise.

Funeral services were held at the family residence in Heppner at 11 o'clock on Tuesday morning, Rev. J. V. Crawford officiating. Burial was in Masonic cemetery under the auspices of Heppner lodge No. 358, B. P. O. Elks, of which order Mr. Currin was a member. It was one of the largest funerals ever held in Heppner, people coming in large numbers from here and other parts of the entire county to show their respect and express their sympathy to the bereaved family.

Edward Robert Currin was born in Clackamas county, Oregon, June 2, 1884, and died in Morrow county, Oregon, March 28, 1914. He came to this county in 1898 when the family moved up here from the Willamette Valley and settled on a farm north of Jordan Siding where they farmed for five years. They later came to Heppner and Mr. Currin engaged in the sheep business as a partner with his father and helped to carry on the work in connection with one of the biggest ranches of the county. He was a fine young man of clean habits and liked by all who knew him.
