Road Building Notes.

Supervisor Jensen reports that the new steel bridge across Eagle Creek will be ready for use within the next month, as all material is on the spot and the Pacific Coast Construction Co., the contractors, are ready to begin its erection now. The bridge will cost \$4,300.

This bridge will be the link connecting George and Estacada and from now on it is hoped that the enterprising George people will feel that Estacada is their shipping and buying center.

Estacada people are especially interested in this work, for the merchants some time ago made a liberal donation to the George district to be used in building such a road. This donation, while a small part of the entire cost of the work, has been wisely expended and should bring returns many fold.

For the past month the George people have been busily at work opening the new road up this side of the Eagle Creek Canyon, through the Frank Thomas property, thence joining with the lower Garfield road into Estacada. A fine 5% grade has been obtained up the canyon and while the road is not full width at present, it is sufficiently wide to allow of teams passing. Probably no crushed rock can be put on the grade this year but some gravel will be used, making it a good summer road and passable in winter.

People owning autos or other conveyances should take early advantage of the coming opening of this highway to take a delightful scenic trip to the growing agricultural George country and get better acquainted with its hustling people.

Clackamas County Pioneer Passes.

At 7:30 Tuesday night, June 23, occurred the death of Mrs. William Emmett, at her home in Estacada. Part of the family were present at the bedside.

Mrs. Emmett was in her 78th year and her death was the result of old age and general breakdown.

Mrs. Emmett was one of the early Clackamas county pioneers, having crossed the plains in ox team with her parents from Missouri in 1852 and located near Oregon City. Her maiden name was Mary Lamb and about 1855 she married Isaac Stormer of the, then Oregon Territory. She has resided in Clackamas county the majority of her life, having lived most of the time near Viola and Estacada, with the exception of about 16 years when she lived in Eastern Oregon and while there, was married to Wm. Emmett. She had in all eight children, five of whom are living, being Frank Stormer of Grant county; Abe Stormer of McMinnville; John Stormer of Estacada; Mrs. M. Anderson of Bend and Mrs. M. Kandle of Tillamook.

The burial will be in charge of W. D. Henthorn, undertaker, and will take place at the Lone Oak cemetery, after the services at the Christian church. Services at 11, Friday morning.

Mrs. Emmett leaves behind scores of close friends and acquaintances, who join with the Progress in expressing their sincere sympathy to the family in their bereavement.

Frank Ewing, engineer in charge of the upper Clackamas work, reports that a party comprising Messrs. Griffin, Townsend and Caldwell of the P. R. L. & P. Co., Mr. Sherard of the Government Forestry Dept. and Noble McMullan, Mr. Ewing's assistant, will make a trip up the Clackamas river and its tributaries to inspect the sources of future water power, the forests and other resources. The party expects to leave this week and be away about 6 days.

Estacada Development League

This organization was formed Monday night last with the new name adopted in place of the customary "Commercial Club" title. The original meeting was not as well attended as it should have been, but after a ten minute recess, those present returned with additional members and the meeting began business with temporary officers E. W. Bartlett, chairman and Irwin Wright, secretary in charge. The meeting adopted a constitution and by-laws after considerable discussion, deciding on the new name of the organization and limiting its initiation fee to 25c and the monthly dues to 25c. The next regular meeting will occur Monday evening, July 13 at 8 P. M. sharp at the C. I. C. rooms. At that time it is expected to have a rousing crowd of the local men, not only the merchants, but all of the men over 18 years of age in this community, officers will then be elected and the new organization launched.

The object of the league is to help the development of Estacada and its surrounding country. It is hoped that every man in this community will join, as the initiation fee and dues are low and the more members the better the work that can be accomplished.

While it probably will not be necessary, the organization may have to appeal to the C. I. C. to get their members to personally see to it that their husbands are present at the next meeting.

C. I. C. CLEAN UP DAY.

C. have been thoroughly canvassing the town with a view to getting all merchants and property owners to hold a CLEAN UP DAY WEDNESDAY, JULY 1st. This applies especially to the downtown district, along Broadway, Main, Second and Third Sts. It is likely that the Estacada Fire Dept. will furnish hose and will wash down the main streets after cleaning. Arrangements have been made for a wagon to handle the refuse. This clean up does not include the ash can and alley cleaning, as formerly. Estacada is to be host to hundreds of outsiders July 4th, and the city should present a clean, orderly appearance. Everyone get out with broom, rake or shovel next Wednesday morning.

Mrs. Elsie Jane Tite, mother-in-law of H. E. Worden, formerly of Estacada, died at the home of her daughter, 16 miles south of Estacada, June 21st. Mrs. Tite was 73 years old and had been ailing for some time. Undertaker W. D. Henthorn brought the body to Estacada and with the assistance of F. A. Chapman prepared same for shipment to Portland, where the funeral arrangements are being held up, awaiting the arrival of other members of the family.
