School Notes

A regular school meeting was held Tuesday evening, directors Reed, Demoy, Jorg and Clerk Morgan present. It was generally understood that the voting on a Union High School for Estacada and vicinity will come up this fall. The Union High School idea is that each district shall have one member and one member only on the school board and the elimination of tuition for outside pupils. Because of the crowded condition in the High School it was voted to obtain if possible, the church building across Main Street for the primary department and the use of the Christian Church for the sewing classes. Luther Henthorn was elected janitor to succeed A. J. Mills. The Tracy School proposition of transporting their pupils each day to and from the Estacada schools at a cost of \$75. per month, including tuition, was made, subject to acceptance by the school district mentioned.

C. E. Frevtag of Oregon City will address the Estacada Industrial Club on Friday afternoon July 3rd, at 2:30 o'clock. All members and advisors of clubs in this part of the county are invited to attend. Mr. Frevtag will talk on "The Silent Partner and the Accountant." Lloyd H. Ewald is the president of the club.

A. G. Ames brought in a basket of 35 nice trout last Saturday night, caught below the River Mill dam. Ames hooked and landed, Monday night, an eight pound Chinook salmon, on a No. 10 fly with a regular trout outfit, it took him 75 minutes to bring the fish to shore.

Walter Paulsen landed a 40 lb. Chinook on light tackle last Saturday morning near River Mill, the fish and the lucky angler were photographed to prove the story. In as much as the Progress did not see this fish, it cannot be entered as a contestant for the largest salmon. The present record is Ames, with a little 8 lb. one, with Simon's 16 inch trout in its class.

Council Doings

At the last meeting of the city council, E. B. Byers was elected and duly sworn in as councilman representing the second ward, in place of J. A. Somers, who has gone east.

The council has hired Clackamas County Road Superintendent Hobson to make a survey with a view to establishing correct street and side walk grades. This survey will comprise most of the flat, although bench marks will be established elsewhere within the corporate limits. Mr. Hobson, with assistants is already at work.

The council have made tentative arrangements to grant an appropriation, which shall represent the city's share of the expense of the contemplated gravel bunkers, soon to be erected in Estacada.

Road Building Notes

Work has been going on steadily in the various districts and a reference to the Oregon City Courier of last week will give an idea of the daily expenditures in the districts.

Supervisor Millard of Springwater No. 33 has been continuing the grading on the hill and four or five days more labor will see the grade completed. It is hoped there will be little delay in getting the gravel to finish the work then.

Supervisor Duncan of Garfield No. 10 has had a full crew busy on the road below the Zion church near the Holkin place. They are putting on crushed rock from the crusher located about half a mile west on the Butler place.

Supervisor Kitching and crew of Currinsville No. 4 have finished the rock bed on the main Currinsville road and work has been discontinued until gravel can be obtained.

Supervisor Janssen of George No. 9 has been working all hands on the new Eagle Creek Canyon road, as mentioned in last week's issue of the Progress.

Supervisor Hunt's men of Garfield No. 49 have been busy getting the new crusher installed and ready for operation, near the Hayes mill on the new road, as there is a plentiful supply of good rock nearby.

The editor made a pleasant auto trip through Eagle Creek district the past week and noted plentiful signs of road building and repairing. It will be appreciated if road building notes from that section will be furnished the paper each week.

It begins to look as though it would be but a short time before the gravel bunkers will be built in Estacada. The county has had the survey made for the spur track near the old Springwater bridge road, the various road districts are ready to furnish their share of the money to build them, and the Estacada City Council will appropriate their part. The P. R. L. & P. Co. will build the spur and complete their end of the work. Supervisor Millard went to confer with the County Court Wednesday about getting the Barton gravel pit opened up for immediate use. The installing of these bunkers will save a large amount of money to the users of gravel and crushed rock as the loading can be done in a minute, where formerly it took several men from 20 minutes to half an hour.

Messrs. Robley and Drill are again working to get the proper parties to commence building the wagon road from Estacada to Cazadero. This road has already been surveyed and passed on by the county court, but the necessary money for the work is not forthcoming. It is likely that the railroad company will do more than their share, as usual. The completion of this road will be a big convenience to all concerned.

Where they stand on Prohibition

The following letter has been sent to each of the candidates who are running for the State Legislature from Clackamas county and unless they dodge the issue, the people will know where they stand:

Dear Sir:

Are you in favor of State and National prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors?

If the Oregon Dry Amendment is not adopted by the people next November, and if you are elected to the legislature, will you do all in your power to obtain the passage of a law prohibiting the importation of intoxicating liquors into dry territory?

We are publishing this letter for the information of the public and will endeavor to secure equal publicity for your reply. We hope you will give us an answer by return mail and that it may be direct and unequivocal.

July 4th Celebration

With the present favorable weather conditions, the coming celebration will eclipse all former ones. It is expected that over 3,000 people will be in Estacada and in the Park on that day. The C. I. C. has spared no pains to make this a big success, and much credit is due the various committees, who have worked overtime to do their share. The Grand Parade starts promptly at 10 A. M. and the committee in charge states that "It will start on time, if only the 300 committee is present and have to walk the route," but there is nothing to hinder all floats, organizations and other features being on time. The Parade forms as follows:—

- DIVISION 1
- Marshal of the Day with Aides, Currinsville Band, Goddess of Liberty, Floats from Country Districts.
- Division 1 forms on Main St. near school, facing south.
- DIVISION 2
- Ladies Band of Estacada, C. I. C. Float, Ladies on Horse Back, Gentlemen on Horseback, Butterfly Float, Decorated Horse and Buggy, Miscellaneous Entries.

Division 2 forms on street in front of school, facing west.

- DIVISION 3
- Firemen with Decorated Hose Cart, Industrial Floats, Decorated Autos, Bicycle Riders.
- Division 3 forms on Fifth St. facing west.

Division 4 forms on Third St. near Garage.

Parade will move south on Main St. to Third, thence west on Third to Broadway, on Broadway to Second, thence east on Second to Main, south on Main to First, east on First to Currin, north on Currin to Second, west on Second to Main, north on Main to foot of hill and disband. Ball game and gun club shoot follow directly after the parade.
