CATTLE: Fed stuff, \$7.50; grass steers, \$7.25; cows, \$6.00 to \$6.25; spayed heifers, \$6.75, and bulls ranging from \$4.00 to \$4.50.

HOGS: Average top price \$8.00. SHEEP: Top yearlings, \$5.00; two year olds, \$4.75; ewes, \$4.25, and lambs, \$5.00.
