News from the Upper Clackamas Three small fires have been reported on the upper Clackamas during the last week, these fires were all started by an electrical storm which swept over this locality about a week ago.

A new fire station is being built on Mt. Lowe. This station will be equipped with all the latest instruments for discovering and locating forest fires. Dee Wright, government packer, met with quite a painful accident while handling a ferocious mule, known as Dynamite.

A boy about 13 years old has been wandering around in the mountains for the past two weeks visiting the Ranger stations and sheep camps. He refuses to give his name or tell where he came from. One of the packers told the boy that he had come after him; the boy took down the trail on a run and has not been seen since.

Last week Russ Wilcox saw an old bear and two cubs crossing the Clackamas river near Roaring River Ranger Station. Russ didn't cross the river at this point. Several good catches of trout have been reported by parties camped along the Clackamas river. H. M.

Estacada's Sidewalks The big majority of the sidewalks in Estacada were built at the time the city was platted, about eight or nine years ago and most of them are now worn out. Not only the top boards but the stringers are rotted away, giving a rocking "merry-go-round" effect in many places.

The incline on the east side of Main street was built of old material to a large extent and the boards are daily giving out. Nails wont hold down these old loose boards, as the stringers are rotted out beneath. The stretch of walk on Third street from Main to Broadway, is a disgrace to any neighborhood, with nails sticking up from a half to three quarters of an inch in many places, and more than one pair of new shoes have been cut and scraped on these projections.
