Resignation Accepted

The official board of the Estacada Christian Church, after last Sunday's service, duly accepted the resignation of Mr. W. Givens, who has acted as pastor of the church for the past three years. The only reason given by Mr. Givens for his resignation, is that he feels it was best for the interests of the church to have a change of pastors. The official Board is now working with a view to obtaining a successor in the near future. Most of the Estacada people are acquainted with the hard work and the good results that have accrued to the Christian Church under the leadership of Mr. Givens and his successor will have to be a man of energy, grit and faith to carry on the work as laid down by his predecessor. Mr. Givens intends to remain in Estacada and as ever look after the welfare and business of the P. R. L. & P. Co.

Ford's Travels

Principal Ford of the Estacada schools expects to be in Elwood, Colton and Dodge, August 4th and 5th; August 6th at Viola; 7th at Upper Logan. His work is along the lines of soliciting business for the Estacada schools, to interest eighth grade graduates in continuing their education with a high school course. The result of last week's work on Mr. Ford's part, will probably mean an increased attendance of from four to six pupils in the high school next year.

Mr. Ford reports that Mr. Hughes of Upper Redlands, the Guernsey man, will exhibit some of his fine heifers and bulls at the coming Eastern Clackamas Fair. Mr. Carlsson and son of the same place will make a fine corn exhibit also. Mr. Cockerline of Viola will exhibit his White Leghorn chickens and Indian Runner Ducks.

New Trucking Business

Beginning Wednesday of this week, the Reo Intercity Truck Service started at Estacada, with a big three ton Reo truck, in charge of Peter Neilson and with headquarters at Reed's garage.

It is the intention to make round trips daily to Portland, hauling freight and merchandise, that is, making a speciality of first and second classifications of freight only.

The truck will cover a regular route, via Eagle Creek, Barton and Clackamas into Portland. The trip will take about three hours each way, including stops.

The representative of this truck is around this week, soliciting freight and hauling from the local merchants.

Foot Ball Schedule

Mgr. Earl Tracy reports the following schedule of games for the Estacada High School Foot Ball Team has been arranged: Oct. 3rd, Washougal at Estacada; Oct. 10th, Canby at Canby; Oct. 17th, Hill Military Acad. at Estacada; Oct. 24th, Gresham at Gresham; Oct. 31st, Hillsboro at Estacada; Nov. 14th, Camas at Estacada. Other games will be scheduled and notice will appear here in later issues.

Rumor is current that petitions for the formation of a Union High School at Estacada will be ready for circulation within a week. The Union High School is to include the following districts; Estacada, Springwater, Dodge, Elwood, Viola, Tracy and Garfield at this time, and additions may come in at any desired time.

R. C. Deming of Garfield made a two-day trip through the Willamette Valley and conferred with other loganberry growers in that section. The samples of dried fruit displayed by him are superior in size and general appearance to any of the valley fruit. A display of this fruit will be made at the Portland Chamber of Commerce and will also appear in our local exhibits.

Walter Crane and son have been repairing the Redlands phone line through Springwater the past week.

Development League Meeting

A very enthusiastic special meeting of the League was held Monday evening at the C. I. C. rooms, with about thirty men in attendance.

The committee in charge of the Estacada cannery, reported in detail, and after a general discussion by all present, it was decided best to have the cannery organized along the co-operative lines with shares at \$50 each, same being payable in easy installments, or partly in fruit delivered to the cannery. It was decided that not less than \$5,000 be raised, as experiences of other canneries all showed that failure and reorganization were largely due to working with too small a capital. The committee contemplates holding a big meeting in Estacada in the near future and immediately getting busy and raising the necessary funds to begin the erection of the building this fall.

The League also thoroughly discussed the advent of the new auto truck service between Estacada and Portland and the consensus of opinion was in favor of the merchants continuing their support to the P. R. L. & P. Co. as formerly, realizing the good will that has always existed between that corporation and the inhabitants of this town.

Dr. Adix made a few remarks regarding the condition of the water in Estacada at present and stated that negotiations are under way to try to furnish this city with water from the contemplated Oregon City supply from the South Fork of the Clackamas.

The next regular monthly meeting will be next Monday night, Aug. 3rd, at 8 P. M., at the C. I. C. rooms. Everyone is invited to be present for the discussions and talks on vital local matters are entertaining as well as instructive.

Clackamas County Fair

Mr. Ward B. Lawton, secretary of the Clackamas County Fair Association, was an Estacada visitor last Tuesday and stopped at the Progress office to get acquainted.

Mr. Lawton left at this office, some exhibit tags, to be tied to the different exhibits as brought in, these tags show the name of the grower and the locality where grown.

Mr. Lawton went from Estacada up to Garfield to confer with Phil F. Standish, who is in charge of the horticultural exhibit at the coming Canby Fair.

There are also a few copies of the Premium Lists for this fair at this office and may be had on application.

Remember — Estacada wants exhibits of all kinds, to be used: first at the Eastern Clackamas Fair in Estacada, Sept. 8th and 9th; then to be exhibited at the Canby Fair, Sept. 16th to 19th inclusive and then at the Portland Land Products Show, Oct. 26th to Nov. 14th. Finally Estacada hopes to bring them all back home and establish a permanent exhibit near the station in Estacada. Are you going to do your share?
