The annual picnic of the Garfield Country Club was held at the club's grounds Saturday, August 8th, and was a big success from start to finish.

A big, happy crowd of about 400 people attended during the day, made up from all sections, with large delegations from Estacada and George with a goodly sprinkling from points farther away.

Many automobile loads of picnickers began arriving in the morning and with the large number of farm wagons and carriages, presented the appearance of a county fair.

The program began immediately after dinner and while one or two of the scheduled speakers were not present, their absence was more than made up by impromptu speakers.

Mr. E. W. Bartlett of Estacada acted as master of ceremonies and with Mr. Guy Hunt, the club's president, handled the program in good style. County Court and Railway Company

At a meeting held last week between the Clackamas County Court and the P. R. L. & P. Co.'s representative, Mr. F. D. Hunt, the railway company agree to immediately build the needed switch track at Barton to allow of early shipping of the gravel from those pits to Estacada and other points.

The Estacada Gravel Bunkers were defeated temporarily, owing to the high estimated cost of the work and the county does not feel that it can afford to spend such an amount. The trestle for the Estacada bunker system would cost a large sum as it would have to be over 100 yards long and the other part of the installation would be expensive.

For this season, Estacada will have to be content with unloading its gravel by hand, as formerly.

Just as soon as the gravel is laid down here, the mayor states that the work will begin on the improving of Main and Second Sts. from Dale's corner to the Drug Store.

WATER GERM LADEN

ESTACADA'S WATER POLLUTED
State Board of Health Reports.

FIRE SUPPLY LOW

Council Must Get Busy
New Water Supply Must be had for City

A report has just been received from the Oregon State Board of Health, by Dr. R. Morse, Estacada's health officer, with the following notation:

"The examination of the sample of water received from you July 30th showed 350 organisms per c. c. and colon bacilli positive." Calvin S. White.

State Health Officer. Dr. Morse advises everyone to drink only boiled water for the present at least. This proportion of bacilli in one cubic centimeter of water, means the presence of 22,400 microbes to each ordinary eight ounce glass of drinking water.

Dr. Morse states that the colon bacillus is plentifully found in the intestinal tract of man and of the higher animals. Its presence in drinking water indicates that the water at some point has been infected with dejecta from man or animals. Drinking water may contain many bacteria that are harmless but the colon bacillus is not one of these and its presence in Estacada's water, makes it unfit to drink, or for domestic use, such as washing of foods, etc. Typhoid fever is a disease that frequently occurs in early autumn following a hot dry summer, such as the present season.

Water containing sewerage contamination is peculiarly dangerous at such a time and should be thoroughly boiled before using.

Dr. Adix, in a recent report, states that the water from all of the springs in or adjacent to the city is more or less contaminated, with the least contamination in the water from the old brick yard spring and the one in Estacada Park.

Cold, clear water is not necessarily fit to drink, as most of the wells on the Estacada lower or upper flats receive a strong impregnation from sewerage, toilets and barn yards, even if several hundred yards distant. There is a hard sub-strata underlying this city and all sewerage readily passes along or through it, until it reaches a well or spring.

Marshal Ames made a trip Wednesday along the creek which furnishes Estacada's water supply, to see if anything can be done to lessen this condition. The water is low in the creek, in fact so low that in case a fire should break out in Estacada now, there would not be sufficient water to fight it for over fifteen minutes.

The Progress does not like to have to chronicle such a condition of Estacada's water, for it does not act as a good advertisement for the town, but under the conditions it is necessary to warn all users for the present to boil the water first.

The city council will have to get busy at once and arrange for a new water supply or filtration system for the city. This movement should not be put aside until some later date. The sidewalks, sewers and street improvements can wait as they have been for past years, if necessary, for they do not effect the health of the people as vitally as the water supply does, but something must be done at once to supply Estacada with good water.

This sounds simple enough, but unpolluted water in sufficient quantity is hard to get here, even with Estacada surrounded with mountain streams. It looks as though Oregon City will change the course of their pipe line, going over the ridge down along Clear Creek, so it is not likely that any help will come from that contemplated work. Water could be obtained from the North Fork, but it means a big expenditure of money and the city is bonded to the limit now. Some solution to this problem must be presented very soon and the city council must get busy.
