Union High School Defeated By a vote of 127 against, to 79 for, the measure to form a Union High School at Estacada was defeated.

Rumors of a new "red brick school house" to be built in Estacada, of a "big gymnasium" to be erected at big expense, of the outside districts having to "pay for the present school building", of the measure including "all grades from the 3rd grade up", besides stories detrimental to Estacada in general, killed the measure.

Had Estacada voters attended their meeting and voted, the measure would have carried anyway, but it is as well they did not vote, for unless the outside districts want the Union High School, it should not be formed.

The lack of civic pride in school elections in Estacada is deplorable and unless some interest is taken in the future, we cannot expect to maintain our present high grade of schools.
