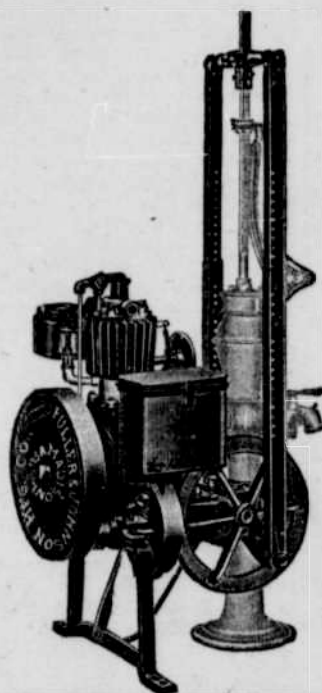

ESTACADA WINS FIRST

Clackamas County Fair

Estacada was awarded the first prize yesterday afternoon in the community exhibit in what was considered the closest competition that has been seen at the Clackamas County Fair in several years past.

A great deal of the credit for this result is due to Editor Standish of the Estacada Progress, who has worked with the Estacada people until he knows them individually, personally, intimately, and every other way, and has accomplished wonders with the amount of material he has had to work with.

We understand that the Estacada people hesitated for a long time as to whether they should send an exhibit to the Fair or not, and finally, through the efforts of both Mr. Standish and the representatives of the Portland Railway Light & Power Co., they were persuaded to take a part in the community exhibit, with the result that they carried off the first-prize, to the great chagrin of the many communities which have had a sort of a monopoly on this prize in the years past.

We extend to Estacada our heartiest congratulations on their success in this, their first efforts, and hope to see them represented every year in the future.

The exhibit shown by this hustling community was without doubt one of the best seen at the Fair in many years and shows what can be done when any one community sets its very heart and soul towards a goal, no matter what that goal may be.

Recall Petition

Portland papers state that recall petitions are already in circulation in Clackamas County, to recall Commissioner W. H. Mattoon.
