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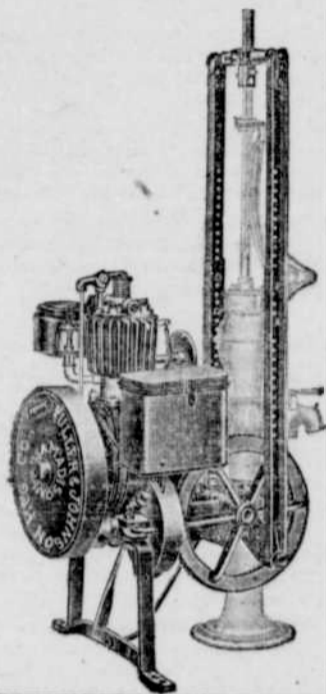

GEORGE COMMUNITY FAIR

The George Community Fair held at the Club House and Pavilion at George was a grand success and all through the optimism and co-operation of the thrifty people of the communities of George and Bissell, about 200 being present.

The opening program was in the form of speeches, dealing with the welfare, upbuilding and progress of the community, past, present and future. The speakers were H. C. Stephens, as Chairman, who spoke of the work and organization of the Club and Fair; H. Joyner, as President and Organizer, as well as Originator of the Club and Fair Association, spoke of the progress of the Club up to the present time. The organization is composed of and represented by all the families of the communities of George and Bissell. The buildings have been built by a novel system, the members donating \$6.00 in cash and \$9.00 in work to accomplish the work of making a Community home, \$1,000.00 has been spent so far in the expense of buildings and additions, to the present time.

Prof. Fitts of the O. A. C. was next as speaker and was also the judge of all exhibits. All exhibitors received blue ribbons with one exception, and that was a red one. Next year will see more and better exhibits.

Mr. Cross, Agricultural Expert of the P. R. L. & P. Co., spoke of the progress done by his department among the farmers of the communities near.

Mr. Werlein of the Railway Co., last but not least, spoke of the optimism and co-operation among the farmers and stated that he had yet to find a community that stuck together and co-operated more for their home community than the people of George and Bissell. He dwelt upon the fact that swine, sheep and horses were not in evidence, but next year will see all those and then some.

The Garfield Band furnished pleasant music throughout the day, and the George Choir furnished some excellent vocal selections.

The agricultural, horticultural, poultry, live stock (mostly Jersey), fancy work, canned goods and culinary exhibits were all fine. Prof. Fitts commenting upon the fine display in the horticultural department. Bissell had an extremely fine display in a separate booth.

Luncheon, as served by the ladies of the community, was commented upon as the best there was to be found anywhere.

In the afternoon, sports of all kinds were indulged in. The fat men's race, three-legged race, women's race, girls' race and nail driving contest were all drawing cards.

In the evening, the exhibits were auctioned off to the highest bidder, and the First Annual Fair of the George Social and Commercial Club came to a close after a big dance, which lasted into the wee hours of the morning, and then the thoughts of next year's better and bigger fair will come up for discussion and plans.

Among those present from out of the community, were Messrs. Hunt, Townsend, Werlein, Cross and Kelly of the P. R. L. & P. Co., and W. F. Cary and J. W. Reed of Estacada.

Mr. and Mrs. Dunlop of Garfield have arranged for a meeting of the railway officials, and people of Garfield for Oct. 6th at the Grange hall. The swine question from a practical standpoint will be discussed in all its branches, and results are sure to follow. Everybody come.
