## High School Census of Dairy Cattle

Under the supervision of Mr. Guthrie, the class in Dairy Farming will this year undertake to make a census of all milk cows within a radius of 2 miles from the schoolhouse. This will include the weighing of the milk for one day as well as the sampling for butter fat test of every cow in the outlined section. Name, description, breeding, period of lactation, etc., will be included in the data gathered. The object, in addition to class training, is to have a public record of the actual performance of every cow, which should prove useful to both buyers and sellers. This small area for census taking will be enlarged as time permits.

It is hoped that the owners of all cows will co-operate with Mr. Guthrie and the class in making the census as accurate and complete as possible.

For the sake of uniformity, all weighing and sampling will be done by the pupils.

Of course, this special census will not interrupt the making of tests for any and all cow owners in this part of Clackamas County.

Another meeting will be held in the near future, when it is hoped that the Democratic candidate for Governor, Dr. C. J. Smith, will be present.
