When the court met, our local supervisors were very much in evidence and they put up a good square fight for their districts.

### Paving Being Rushed

### Garfield Meeting

Last Tuesday evening, at the Garfield Grange Hall, a meeting was held for the discussion of the swine raising question.

About thirty farmers and a few of the wives were present, and the evening was well spent in a general talk on the subject of hogs and hog raising.

T. W. Cross of Gresham, the agricultural expert for the P. R. L. & P. Co., made a good talk on the subject, not only from the railway company's standpoint, but on the question of breeding, feeding, and hog raising as a business or side line.

Mr. Cross found an enthusiastic audience and the general discussion showed that the Garfield farmers know hogs and hog raising, but they were willing to know more about the business. Arguments, questions and answers were freely exchanged, on all kindred subjects from subsoil plowing to crossed breeds, and proper weights for marketing.

J. E. Werlein, F. D. Hunt and R. M. Townsend, of the railway company, were to have been present, but were unable to attend, owing to their absence from the city.

The question of the formation of cattle and swine breeding clubs, was discussed, and this meeting was but the beginning of the ultimate formation of such organizations in the Estacada country.

### Cannery Notes

During the recent State Fair, the editor had an opportunity to talk with Mr. J. R. Newton of Hood River and Canby, regarding a cannery for Estacada.

Mr. Newton is a man of the highest integrity and financial standing in his home towns and has a fine reputation as a successful, economical canner.

Through the efforts of Mr. Leroy D. Walker, of the Estacada State Bank, Mr. Newton's attention was directed to the Estacada country, and he is arranging to make an extended trip through this section in a few weeks.

Mr. Newton's Hood River cannery has just completed a very successful season, having canned pears, cherries, beans, peas and strawberries, all of which have found a ready market among the wholesalers.

Mr. Newton says that \$2500.00 is sufficient to build and equip a good cannery and if the people of this community will raise that amount of money and build such a cannery as the one at Hood River, he will agree to lease the cannery outright and operate it and finance the business end.

He claims it would be wasted energy to build a cannery until 1916, and then only providing that a good acreage of the proper products can be planted during 1915. For instance, Mr. Newton states that the Clark's Seedling is the only strawberry that a cannery will handle and make a success of, and he would want a fifty acre planting next year, so as to have the fruit ready for 1916 canning. He would also want 50 acres planted to Refugee beans, as they are the best for that business. These two products, with Royal Ann and some other varieties of cherries and Bartlett pears, will keep a cannery running throughout a season.

Such a cannery as this, would give employment to many men and women and would be a big stimulus to Estacada and surrounding country.

Mr. Newton is not a cannery promoter, but a practical and successful canning man and it is to be hoped that Estacada people will join hands with him and get him to locate here. He does not believe in trying to can all kinds and varieties of products, but insists on steady supply before beginning work and that means planting in advance. He paid \$10.00 per ton for Bartlett pears this year at Hood River.

### Ownership of Clackamas County Homes

The United States Census Department at Washington has just issued a bulletin dealing with the ownership of Clackamas county homes. The important facts contained in the bulletin relative to this county are as follows: There are 1,716 homes in Clackamas county. Of this number, 3,525 are farm homes; 1,982 of the farm homes are owned by their occupants and are free of mortgaged incumbrance.

The mortgaged farm homes number 1,019. Renters occupy 503 farm homes in this county.

Out of a total of 7,116 homes in the county, 3,591 are urban homes. There are 1,982 urban home owners in the county. Of this number, 547 are mortgaged; 1,404 of the urban owned homes are free of incumbrance.

There are 1,489 rented urban homes in the county.

The census enumerators were unable to secure data pertaining to the ownership of a small percentage of both the rural and urban homes in this county.
