### Foot Ball

### Road Supervisors Notice.

Attorney C. W. Devore, of Estacada, has received from the county clerk, notices for the special road meetings, to be held in the various districts.

The supervisors may obtain one of these notices from Mr. Devore. It is necessary that all road meetings be held in time to allow of the report of the meeting to be in the hands of the county clerk by Dec. 1st.

The law requires that all such meeting notices, shall be advertised for three weeks prior to the meeting and a notice posted up for ten days prior.

This matter should not be delayed owing to the three weeks interval of advertising, comprising four issues of the paper, which must precede such meeting.

### City's Roller

The paving on Main and Second Sts. has progressed rapidly, with all of the bed of boulder rocks in place. The bed appears too high, but after being well rolled, it will probably get down to its proper level. Owing to the sagging sidewalks, in the vicinity, it is hard to determine the exact grade with the naked eye.

Marshal Ames, Ray Eschleman, Willis Mayfield and others, are building a monstrous wooden roller, to take the place of a steam roller, as it is impossible to hold up the paving here, until one of the county rollers is at leisure. This roller looks like a fir juggernaut and when finished should do the work, with sufficient means of locomotion.

Up to Oct. 15th, Recorder Devore shows that about \$376. had been spent on this work, leaving a balance of about \$600. with which to finish the job.

Dr. Adix at his own expense is paving that part of Second St. adjoining his property, from the line of the city's work to the curb. The railroad company is considering doing the same along their property and if other property holders would do likewise, it would mean one complete block of good paving, and would act as an incentive and model for more such improvement.
